education of 100 boys and 100 girls, who are taught on the Laucasterian system; the master and mistress are allowed ten pounds per annum each, and a small sum is paid quarterly by the parents of the children. There are still remaining the steeple and part of the walls of the old church, which, before the reformation, was a Catholic cathedral, and near half a mile from it are the ruins of a friary, now known by the name of Mullagh church. MAGHERAFELT

Is a small near market and post town in the county A. Vesey is the present rector.
