In the county of Down, is a handsome, tolerably large, and ancient market town, 87½ miles north of Dublin, 7½ east of Belfast, and 6½ west of Donaghadee, pleasantly situated at the northern extremity of Strangford Lough, and well sheltered from the west and north by the contiguous hills.
