

EDENDERRY.

A MARKET and post town at the north eastern extremity of the King's county, and near the river Boyne, is 28 miles west of Dublin and 9 north of Rathangan. The woollen trade was formerly carried on to a considerable extent, but within these few years unfavourable changes have taken place; at present its principal trade is in corn, of which great quantities are brought to this market, and purchased by the neighbouring dealers. The church is a neat stone building with a tower and one bell, is situate on a rising ground, and commands a view of the river and of the surrounding country. Within the church is a stone tablet to the memory of Sarah Lady Blundell, who died in the year 1701; this stone was discovered in the ruins of the old church of Monasteroris, distant about a mile and a half, and was removed hither in 1814, by Mary, Marchioness Downshire, and Baroness Sandy, the heiress and near descendant of Montague Lord Viscount Blundell. Besides the church, the Catholics possess a handsome chapel,

and the Methodists and Quakers have each a place of worship. The charitable institutions are, eight almshouses for poor widows, the gift of the Marquis of Downshire, who is the Lord of the Manor; a dispensary supported by subscription; a free school for children of both sexes; and a Sunday school, established in August 1823, for children of all denominations. The town has been much improved within these few years, most of the thatched cabins having been taken down, and replaced with good stone-built and slated houses. A new road is also making from this town to Rathangan, which will cut off three miles, and bring the two towns within 6 miles of each other. A seneschal court is held here on Thursdays and Saturdays for the recovery of small debts, at which John Browning and Thomas Murray, Esqrs. preside.—The population of the town and neighbourhood, in 1821, was 1439. Saturday is the market-day, and fairs are held on Shrove Tuesday, Whitsun-Thursday, and on the 4th of November.

PASSAGE BOATS.

A Passage Boat passes within half a mile of Edenderry, at two, and another at half-past eleven in the morning, to Dublin. There are others at four and eleven in the evening, to Tullamore.

ENNISCORTHY

Is a borough post and market town, situated on the river Slaney, 60 miles south of Dublin, 15 south west of Gorey, and 12 north west of Wexford. It is governed by a portreeve and 12 burgesses. The principal trade that is carried on, is in corn for home consumption and exportation; and next to Clonmel, this is considered the greatest inland corn market in Ireland. The river is navigable to Wexford, a distance of 14 miles, and conveys to that market the greater part of the corn purchased here. The principal returns are coals, slates, and earthenware. The river furnishes trout and salmon in abundance. The rector's house is beautifully situated on Vinegar Hill, close to the town, where the rebels were totally defeated and dispersed, on the 21st of June, 1798. The castle, which had been in ruins for upwards of a century, and stands in the centre of the town, within

the last 12 years has been repaired at a considerable expense, and is now occupied by Mr. Hawkins, agent to Earl Portsmouth, who owns the greatest part of the land in the vicinity. The places of worship are, the church, in a very ruinous state; a Roman Catholic chapel; a Methodist chapel; and a Quakers' meeting-house. The public institutions are a Roman Catholic free school; a Sunday school for children of all denominations; a free school for Protestant children, to which the Earl of Portsmouth allows twenty guineas a year; a new stone court-house built within these few years, where the sessions are held twice a year; and a fever hospital and dispensary for the poor of the parish.—Population 4650. The market-days are Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Fairs are held on July the 5th, August the 26th, September the 19th, and October the 10th.

POST OFFICE.—Post Master, Mr. Robert Burkitt. The Mail from Dublin arrives at half-past seven in the morning, and goes to Dublin at half-past five in the evening. The Wexford Mail arrives at half-past five in the evening, and leaves at half-past seven in the morning. The Ferns, Camolin, Gorey, and Arklow Mails, arrive and return with the Dublin Mails. Letters for England, Scotland, and the Continent, are despatched by the Dublin Mail.
