## SUMMERHILL.

IS a small post town in the county of Meath, 19 miles north west of Dublin, five south east of Trim, and five north west of Kilcock. It is the property of Lord Longford, whose beautiful domain adjoins the town, and is in the parish of Larracor. The inhabitants tell the stranger with feelings of honourable pride, that this parish gave birth to the present viceroy of Ireland and his illustrious brothers. The Right

Honourable Hercules Longford made great improvements in this town, which is built in the form of a square, enclosing a bleach green for the use of the inhabitants. There is no weekly Market, but four fairs are held in the year; viz. on the 30th of April, the 9th of June, the 20th of August, and the 26th of November. Population about 300.

## SWORDS.

A POST and fair town in the county of Dublin, situated seven miles north of Dublin, 16 south of Drogheda, eight south west of Skerrie, and eight south of Balbriggan, is said to have been the seat of the first Irish Parliament. It is, undoubtedly, of much antiquity, and was formerly a borough. Here are the remains of an extensive old castle, and a Danish tower in good preservation. The new church

erected in 1817, is a fine edifice, of the Gothic order. There is also a Roman Catholic Chapel, a good Barrack, a parochial School, and a Dispensary. The situation of Swords is exceedingly pleasant, and its neighbourhood the residence of many respectable families. A fair is held on the 17th of March, and another on the 9th of May. Population about 1500.
