BOYLE

AS a considerable market and corporate town, and prior to the Union a parliamentary borough, in the parish and barony of its name, county of Roscommon, 107 miles N.W. from Dublin, 24 S.E. from Sligo, 18 N. from Castlereagh, 11 W. from Leitrim, the like distance N.W. from Elphin, and 8 W. from Carrick-on-Shannon. This town, which is one of great antiquity, is situated on the river Boyle, which flows from Lough Gara into Lough Key, and afterwards into the Shannon. The river, which divides the town into two parts, is crossed by two fine stone bridges, at the foot of one of which is the Royal Hotel. A little eastward of the town are the remains of Boyle Abbey, magnificent even in its ruins. This abbey, which was one of the finest buildings of the kind in the kingdom, perhaps in Europe, was founded by Maurice O'Dubhain in 1161, for Cistercians, and dedicated to the Virgin Mary. In the year 1196, Connor M'Dermott, Lord of Moye, became a monk in it; and here in the following year, died Cornelius M'Dermott, King of Moylurg. In 1235, while the Irish were struggling for independence, the English forces, under Lord Justice Maurice Fitzgerald and M'William, encamped within the abbey walls, and seized all the goods, holy vestments, and church plate, and even stripped the monks. In 1315 this ill-fated place was again plundered by Rory O'Connor; and in 1595 it was besieged by the rebel Tyrone, with an army of 2,300 Irish and Scottish islanders. In 1603 Sir John King obtained a grant from Queen Elizabeth of the abbey, and this grant James I confirmed by another in January, 1618. It is now the property of Lord Viscount Lorton, whose beautiful demesne lies about two miles and a half from Boyle. The mansion, Rockingham House, which is delightfully situated on the south-east side of Lough Key, is of the Grecian-Ionic style, with a noble portico of six columns, on each side of which the facade is embellished with as many of the same order. A colonnade, on the north, is formed of six Ionic columns, and on the east is an entrance through an orangery. The grounds, which are laid out with exquisite taste, are entered by four elegant lodges.

This town is the commercial centre of a valuable agricultural district, and carries on a large trade in grain, butter, and linen. The borough was incorporated by charter of James I, and the corporation styled the 'borough-master, free burgesses, and commonalty of the borough of Boyle.' The borough-master, who is chosen annually, holds a court of record once a month; a seneschal court is likewise held monthly; general sessions twice a year, and petty sessions once a fortnight. The public buildings, exclusive of those for divine worship, comprise a handsome court-house, with convenient bridewell attached; military and constabulary barracks, and a union workhouse. A great improvement has been effected on one side of the river, by laying out new and tasteful pleasure grounds, in the centre of which is a statue of William III. The principal street, which is on the line of approach from the new bridge to the barracks, is well kept, and the dwellings of respectable aspect. The most modern and improved part of the town, however, is on the south side of the bridge ascending the hill, on the summit of which a crescent is formed.

The parish church is a spacious and handsome erection with a square tower; it was built in 1818, when the board of first fruits granted a loan of £1,000, towards its completion. The other places of worship are a commodious Catholic chapel, and one each for Wesleyan Methodists and Baptists. The charitable institutions comprise a dispensary in the town, and two others in the neighbourhood, a loan fund, and free schools for the children of the poor; amongst the latter is one sustained by the munificence of Lady Lorton, for the education of seventy girls; the school premises, erected at the expense of her ladyship, are substantially built of stone. The market, a well-supplied one for provisions, is held on Saturday, and one for linen and butter on Monday. Fairs March 6th, April 3rd, May 9th and 30th, July 9th and 25th, August 6th, and November 25th. The parish of Boyle contained, by the returns made in 1841, 12,591 inhabitants, and the town 3,235 of that number.

CARRICK-ON-SHANNON,

A MARKET and post town (formerly a parliamen-
 tary borough), partly in the parish of Killuken, barony
 of Boyle, county Roscommon, but chiefly in the parish
 of Kiltoghart, barony and county of Leitrim, 99 miles
 N.W. from Dublin, 33 S.E. from Sligo, 23 N.W. from
 Longford, and 17 1/2 S.W. from Ballinamore; situated on
 the mail coach road from Dublin to Sligo, and on the
 north-eastern bank of the Shannon, from which river
 the adjunct to its name is derived. The river is crossed
 by a bridge leading to a suburb in the county of Ros-

common. Although the capital of Leitrim, the town
 can boast but little in the way of appearance that is
 unprepossessing. Its one long and principal street is un-
 paved and imperfectly lighted; yet it contains some
 well-furnished shops, a branch of the London and
 Dublin bank, and two hotels—of the latter, Church's
 establishment is a comfortable one and a good posting-
 house. Carrick is the chief market for grain and pro-
 visions in Leitrim, much of which, however, is supplied
 from Roscommon. The trade in linens, druggets, flax-
