COACHES AND CARS,

Calling at the Mail Coach Office.

To CORK, the Royal Mail (from Limerick), every day at twelve—a Coach, every morning (Sunday excepted), at a quarter past five—and a Car, every forenoon (Sunday excepted) at eleven; all go through Buttevant and Mallow.

To LIMERICK, the Royal Mail (from Cork), every day at a quarter past twelve—a Car, every morning (Sunday excepted), at six; both go through Kilmallock and Brough—and a Car (from Cork), every day (Sunday excepted) at a quarter to twelve; goes through Croom.

To NEWCASTLE, a Car, every day (Sunday excepted) at half-past twelve.

CLOGHEEN,

A VERY respectable little flourishing market town, partly in the parish of Tullaghorton, but chiefly in that of Shanrahan, barony of Ifla and Offa West, county of Tipperary, 120 miles s.w. from Dublin, 25 s. by e. from Tipperary, 20 s. by w. from Cashel, 15 n.e. from Kilmallock, and 14 s.w. from Clonmel; situated on the main road from the last-named town running into Cork county, near the foot of the steep northern ascent of Knockmeladown mountain, and on the small river Tina. A large trade exists here in agricultural produce, chiefly for exportation; the corn trade is very considerable, upwards of seventy thousand barrels being annually purchased by the merchants; that exported is conveyed by land to Clonmel, and thence by lighters to Waterford. The corn mills of the Messrs. Grubbs' are very extensive, employing great power and a considerable number of hands. The principal inn here, 'McCrath's Hotel,' is a very respectable and well-conducted house. There are barracks for the accommodation of cavalry and for a constabulary police force; and a bridewell was erected a few years ago. A manorial court is held in the court-house every month, before the seneschal, Henry O'Brien, Esq. for the recovery of debts not exceeding £10., contracted within the manor of Everard's Castle. General sessions of the peace are held annually on the 28th of December, and petty sessions every alternate Thursday.

There is no Protestant church in Clogheen; but divine service is performed in the school-room, Main street. The Roman Catholic chapel is a remarkably neat building. The Clogheen Charitable Association, formed in 1811, assisted by the county grant, founded a fever hospital, and there is a dispensary connected therewith. About two miles and a half from Clogheen is Shanbally Castle, the elegant residence of Lord Vis-

count Lismore; and at the 94th mile stone are the ruins of Shanrahan Church, said to have been in its day a magnificent structure. At Skiheenanaryiky, on the estate of the Earl of Kingston, is a singular and vast cave well deserving a visit. It is entered through the cleft of a rock, and by a descent of from fifteen to twenty feet, by ladders, a vault is gained of more than one hundred feet in length, and in height between sixty and seventy. Through a small aperture on the left is a winding course of not less than half a mile, exhibiting a variety of objects pleasing and astonishing. In some places the cavity is so capacious that, when lighted up, it assumes the appearance of a vaulted cathedral, supported by massive columns. The walls, ceiling, and pillars are of fantastic form, and often of curious incrustations of spar, which glitter like brilliant diamonds. The stalactites, formed into columns by the dropping of the water, has, in some places, taken regular forms, while, in others, it is variously disposed in light folds of drapery, which hang from the roof in a very pleasing manner. For several hundred yards in the larger branch there is a deep water at the bottom of the declivity to the right. In the immediate vicinity is Bay-Loch, about three-quarters of a mile in circumference; a mountain rises over it with nearly perpendicular ascent to an elevation of six hundred feet, and eagles are not unfrequently seen hovering over the lake. At Castle Grace, near the town, a lead mine was worked some years since, the ore of which contained a large proportion of silver. The market, which is held on Saturday, is well supplied. Fairs, May 27th, August 1st, October 28th, and November 1st. On every second Tuesday in the winter months a market has been established for pigs, which is extensive. Population of the town, 2,050.

POST OFFICE, the BRIDGE, James Sandford, Post Master.—Letters from the NORTH OF IRELAND, also from ENGLAND, arrive (from DUBLIN) from the months of March to November, every morning at ten, and from November to March at eighteen minutes past ten, and are despatched during the former months at three in the afternoon and during the latter at two in the afternoon. Letters from the SOUTH AND SOUTH-WEST OF IRELAND arrive (from CORK) in the summer months at three in the afternoon and in winter at two, and are despatched during the former season at ten in the morning and in the winter months at eighteen minutes past ten.
