CLONMEL,

THE capital of Tipperary county, is a market and assize town and parliamentary and corporate borough and parish, partly in the barony of Upperthird, county of Waterford, but chiefly in that of Iffa and Offa East, county of Tipperary, 104 miles s.s.w. from Dublin, 31 n.w. from Waterford, and 25 s.e. from Tipperary town; situated on the banks of the river Suir, which here bounds the counties of Tipperary and Waterford. The chief streets are long, broad, and gas-lighted, the shops generally handsome and well conducted, and stored with every article for luxury, fancy, or necessity, and some of the public buildings creditable and ornamental. Three bridges, within the limits of the town, bestride the Suir, and communicate with that part seated in the county of Waterford. Clonmel is an acknowledged mart for the produce of a very fertile and extensive district, and being situated on the Suir, which is navigable hence to Waterford, it commands a considerable trade in the export of provisions and agricultural commodities. The butter market house is a capacious building, containing suitable offices for the weigh-master, &c., there all butter sold, either for home use or exportation, must be regularly weighed and entered. The average quantity disposed of, during the season, from May to January, is about fifty thousand firkins. The corn market is very extensive, and the merchants and traders transact more business than those of any town of equal size in Ireland, but there is no market building, and the merchants, consequently, purchase at their respective stores. The flour mills here are on the most extensive scale, surprising the stranger with their magnitude and power, and giving employment to large numbers. Here are three large bacon factories in full operation, and two extensive breweries, and, at a short distance from the town, one of the largest distilleries in Ireland. The 'National Bank of Ireland,' the 'Provincial Bank of Ireland,' the 'Tipperary Joint-Stock Bank,' and the 'Bank of Ireland,' have each a branch establishment here. The principal inns are well conducted establishments—'Hearn's Commercial Hotel,' and the 'Albert,' in Bagwell-street, and the 'West Inn,' Irishtown, may be especially noticed as such; from the first-mentioned house cars depart daily to almost all parts of Ireland.

Clonmel is an ancient parliamentary borough, and continues one under the Reform Act: its present representative is the Right Hon. David R. Pigott, late Attorney-General for Ireland. The borough is governed by a mayor, aldermen, and common council, a portion of which is subject to retire, or be re-elected, once a year, according to the provisions of the Municipal Reform Act. The county magistrates hold a petty sessions here once a week, and there is a mayor's court every Wednesday, for the adjudication of petty offences committed within the mayoralty; the quarter sessions of the peace are also held here in rotation. The court house is a spacious building, affording every accommodation, and eligibly situated. The county gaol and house of correction are admirably conducted establishments; they adjoin and are under the governorship of Mr. Isaac Strahan. In Duncan-street there is a commercial news room, and, in the Main-street, a reform one—both respectably supported by subscription. At the east end of the town stand the barracks, artillery and infantry, with a military hospital contiguous. The mechanics' institute, established about three years, is in a very promising condition, and its conductors are about to erect a suitable building for the carrying out of its purposes. A very neat savings' bank has lately been built in Richmond-street, the funds of which seem in a flourishing condition.

The church of Saint Mary is a venerable pile, one of the oldest parish churches in the country, having been erected about eight centuries: it is in a style of Gothic architecture peculiar to the south of Ireland, but of which the only other specimen now remaining is the Collegiate Church of Youghal. Within the last few years a great improvement has been effected in this church, to the expense of which Her Majesty the Queen Dowager, General Sir Hugh Gough, Bart. the Right Hon. D. R. Pigott, and several distinguished individuals liberally contributed. The chancel has been entirely renewed, and rich stained glass inserted in its principal and beautiful old window, one of the largest in the kingdom. The west window has also been similarly ornamented, and a new and effective organ has been furnished. This ancient fabric is now one of the most interesting country churches, and reflects great credit on Mr. Romley, churchwarden, to whose taste and exertions the accomplishment of these various improvements may be ascribed. The church-yard is large, and surrounded by fine old trees, which form shaded avenues and a pleasant promenade. There are two Roman Catholic churches and a friary. The one in Johnson-street has, within the last few years, become a handsome and elegant building, under the fostering care of the Rev. Dr. Burke, who, with other improvements, has added a beautiful steeple, and an organ of very great power and sweetness. The chapel in Irishtown is an old and unsightly building, and about to be superseded by a new erection. There are three handsome dissenting chapels, for Presbyterians, Baptists, and Methodists, also one for the Society of Friends, who are in Clonmel, a numerous, respectable, and wealthy class. The union workhouse, at the western extremity of the town, was formerly a house of industry, but enlarged and otherwise altered to suit the purposes of the poor-law commissioners; it is efficiently conducted. The lunatic asylum, a very beautiful stone building, with handsome pleasure grounds, is situated in the same direction, but on a more elevated site. The Clonmel endowed school was founded, in 1685, by Richard Moore, Esq., ancestor of the present Earl of Mountcashel, who endowed it with three hundred and seventy-five acres, now producing a rental of £500. per annum, for the gratuitous education of sons of Protestant freemen of the borough. The old school-house being decayed, the present one was built in 1830, a sum of £4,000. being advanced for this purpose, from the consolidated fund, upon the security of the school lands, to be repaid by annual instalments of £240. The premises are capacious, and on a healthy site; the estate is under the management of the commissioners of education for Ireland; the master is appointed by the Marquess of Ormonde, the Earl of Mountcashel, and the Mayor of Clonmel. In Mary-street, opposite the church, is a very handsome parochial school-house, in the Tudor style, principally supported by voluntary contributions. In Irishtown is a national school, and connected with the Presentation Convent is a school for girls. At the north of the town a dispensary and fever hospital afford valuable benefit to the sick poor of this populous town and its vicinity. Contiguous to the town are ranges of lofty mountains, whose dark shadows form a striking contrast with the extreme beauty and lively verdure of the lower scenery, consisting of gently swelling lawns, rising in constant succession, and occasionally well wooded, the whole agreeably interspersed with the seats and villas of the nobility and gentry. Clonmel gives the titles of Earl and Viscount to the family of Scott; the father of the present earl was the Right Hon. John Scott, the cele-

brated Chief Justice of the King's Bench in Ireland, who was created Baron Earlsfort in 1784, and was advanced to the viscounty in 1789, and to the earldom in 1793. The celebrated and eccentric author, the Rev. Lawrence Sterne, was born in this town on the 24th of November, 1713; it was also the birth-place of the talented Countess of Blessington, and it is the residence of Mr. Charles Bianconi, to whom Ireland is so much

indebted for the extension of the economical mode of travelling by cars. The market days are Tuesday and Saturday. Fairs the first Wednesday in every month, except May and November (formerly the only fairs), when they are held on the 5th of those months. The parish of St. Mary, Clonmel, contained, according to the returns made in 1841, 17,720 inhabitants, and the town 13,505 of that number.
