COACHES AND CARS.

To CORK, the Royal Mail (from Tralee)

(Mr. Collins) has adventured to light the streets with
gas. The beauty of its environs, and the tepid mineral
waters for which Mallow is celebrated, has made it a
place of fashionable resort during the summer months,
and the number of seats of the wealthy, in the imme-
diate vicinity, rendered it a desirable place of residence
long before it attained its present importance as one
of trade. The principal public buildings, besides the
places of worship, are the infirmary, court-house, bride-
well, union workhouse, spa and club houses, and bar-
racks. The county infirmary, to which is attached a
dispensary, is a neat plain structure, situated at the
eastern end of the town. The court-house is a newly-
erected building of stone, fronting the market place,
and ornamented with broad pilasters supporting a cor-
nice and pediment. The bridewell is a well-arranged
edifice, at the back of the court-house. The work-
house, erected in the usual style of the new buildings
for the purposes of the poor-law union, is calculated to
afford accommodation for seven hundred persons: the
first admission of recipients took place in August,
1847. The spa-house was erected in 1828, by Charles
Denham Jephson, Esq. the principal proprietor
of the town; it is in the old English style of rural
architecture, and contains a small pump room, reading
room, and baths; the centre fitted up in the most com-
plete manner for supplying, at the shortest notice, hot
and cold salt-water, vapour, and medicated baths. The
water, which resembles that of Clifton, near Bristol,
is considered a powerful restorative to debilitated con-
stitutions, and likewise efficacious in scrofulous and
consumptive cases, for which the spa is much frequented
by numbers from distant parts of the country—being
the only water of the kind yet brought into notice in
Ireland. The approach to the spa from the town is
partly through an avenue of lofty trees, along the banks
of an artificial canal affording some picturesque scenery.
The Mallow Club, consisting of an unlimited number
of the resident gentry of the town and neighbourhood,
was established several years since on a very liberal
scale. The club-house, situated in the principal street,
contains billiard, card, supper, and reading rooms: the
latter, which has a good library, is open to strangers.
There is also a public subscription news room on a
smaller scale. Races are held annually in September;
and the members of the Duhallo Hunt hold their
meetings here. The season at Mallow usually com-

mences in May and terminates about the end of Sep-
tember, during which period there is a considerable
influx of company; and when the improvements which
are contemplated are accomplished around the spa,
advantage will doubtless be taken of the many eligi-
ble and delightful sites, which the vicinity affords for the
erection of pleasant lodging houses.

The inhabitants carry on an extensive trade with the
opulent and populous districts in the neighbourhood,
importing most of their articles of general consumption
direct from England. There are three large corn mills
in the vicinity, two extensive tanneries and two branch
banking establishments in the town. Mallow received
its first charter of incorporation from James I, which
remained in force until the new municipal act regu-
lated the government of the borough. Quarter sessions
for the East Riding of the county are held in April; petty
sessions every Tuesday, by the county magistrates, and
a court baron is held, by the seneschal of the manor,
every third Wednesday, for the recovery of debts under
40s. A court leet is held twice a year for the regula-
tion of the markets and tolls and the election of bailiffs.
The charter of James conferred the privilege of parlia-
mentary representation upon the burgesses, and two
members were returned to the Irish senate until the
Union, since which period but one has been sent to
the imperial parliament—the present representative is
Sir Denham Jephson Norreys, Baronet, the Castle,
in this town, and Union Club, London.

The parish church is a handsome structure, in the
later style of English architecture, with a tower and
well-proportioned spire. It was erected in 1818, on a
site presented by the Jephson family; and a good organ
supplied by subscription. Adjoining the church are the
remains of the ancient edifice, consisting of the tower
and some portion of the walls. The other places of
worship are a large and substantial Roman Catholic
chapel, of modern architecture, and chapels for Inde-
pendents and Wesleyan Methodists. There are four
public schools—a diocesan, a national, a parochial, and
an infants'. A loan fund, the infirmary before noticed,
and a dispensary, are the other principal charities. The
market days are Tuesday and Friday. Fairs February
19th, May 11th, July 25th, and October 28th. The
parish of Mallow contained, by the parliamentary re-
turns for 1841, 9,965 inhabitants, and the town 6,857
of that number.

MALLOW,

A BOROUGH, market town, and parish, partly in
the barony of Duhallo, but chiefly in that of Fer-
moy, East Riding of Cork county, 151 miles s. w. from
Dublin, and 20 n. from Cork; situated on the north side
of the Blackwater, and is joined by a bridge of fifteen
arches to the suburb of BALLYDAHEES on the south
side, which forms a portion of the borough. The Castle
of Mallow, one of the strongholds of the Earl of Des-
mond, stands on the banks of the river near the bridge,

and was erected mainly to command the passage of the
Blackwater. The delightful grounds of this fortress
are open to the public, through the liberality of the pro-
prietor, Sir D. J. Norreys, Bart. M. P. The town is chiefly
