

The streets, with the exception of King-street, Great Georges-street, and some few others lately improved, are generally short, narrow, and irregular in their direction—they are lighted with gas, under the provisions of an act obtained by the corporation. At the east end of the city is the Mall, from which a new and spacious street has been opened, forming the principal western entrance on the Cork road. Among the public buildings of the city may be enumerated the town-hall, the county gaol and court-house, the city gaol and court-house, the chamber of commerce, the custom-house, military barracks, and union workhouse. There are various benevolent and scientific institutions, and hospitals and asylums for the indigent and sick; these will be found enumerated at the end of the city directory, with their functionaries attached, and the schools will be seen under the head 'Academies.' The 'Bank of Ireland,' the 'National Bank,' and the 'Provincial Bank,' have branch establishments here, and there is a bank for savings. Two newspapers are published in Waterford—the 'Chronicle' and the 'Mail;' they are both published on Wednesday and Saturday, and are well patronised. There are several valuable institutions connected with the city, and liberally supported by the neighbouring gentry, landholders, and inhabitants. The Waterford Institution was founded in 1820; the members hold their meetings in the Chamber of Commerce, and have a library, reading-room, and collection of minerals. The Literary and Scientific Society was formed in 1832, for the promotion of knowledge by means of lectures and essays. The society possesses a good philosophical apparatus; and during the session essays are read and lectures delivered by the members. The Agricultural Society, for the promotion of improvement in agriculture, &c. by the distribution of prizes, is liberally supported, and has been of great benefit. The Horticultural Society, under the patronage of the Marquess of Waterford, was founded in 1833; spring and summer shews of fruits, vegetables, and flowers, are held, when prizes are awarded for the best specimens. Waterford is famous for its manufacture of white glass; there are also breweries, salt-houses, foundries, and a very large export trade, to which the extensive inland navigation of the Nore, Suir, and Barrow, greatly contribute, as they also do to the import trade, from the demand for foreign commodities, in the several rich counties and flourishing towns through which they flow. The exports are, to a great degree, agricultural, including bacon, pork, butter, grain, flour, cattle, sheep, and pigs, the value of which amounted, in one year, to £1,818,536. The number and tonnage of sailing vessels registered, as belonging to this port, in 1843, were as follows:—fifty-two under fifty tons, and one hundred and sixteen of fifty tons and upwards, and four steamers of about a thousand tons. The number of vessels that entered the port in the same year engaged in the cross channel trade was twelve hundred and ten, and steamers two hundred and four; the number of sailing vessels outward, in the same year, was one thousand and fifty-nine, and two hundred and ten steamers. In the colonial and foreign trade the number of vessels entered inwards, in 1843, was sixty-two, and outwards forty-six. The gross produce of the customs' duties, including New Ross, in 1843, amounted to £177,554, and the excise duties to £40,541. The port is regulated by twenty-four commissioners, appointed by the corporation and chamber of commerce.

The trade with Newfoundland, once so flourishing and important, is now nearly extinct.

The city first received a charter of incorporation from King John in 1205, and various succeeding monarchs, down to Charles I, amended previous or created new charters. The municipal act remodelled the corporation, which is now composed of a mayor, ten aldermen, and thirty councillors, elected from the five municipal wards into which the city is divided, and styled the 'Mayor, Sheriff, and Citizens of the city of Waterford.' The corporation holds a court of pleas for debts not exceeding £10., and a court of conscience for claims under 40s.; and the mayor presides as occasion may require to adjudicate claims for servants' wages. The assizes for the county are held twice in the year, and general sessions of the peace for the county of the city are held monthly or oftener. The city first sent members to parliament in the year 1374, apparently by prescriptive right, as no charter conveying that privilege has been discovered. From the period named, it continued to send two members to the Irish parliament till the Union, from which time it returned only one to the Imperial Parliament till the passing of the Reform Bill, which restored its original number. The sheriffs are the returning officers; the present representatives are Sir Henry Winston Barron, Belmont House, Waterford, and Grafton-street, London, Bart.; and Thomas Wyse, Wilton-place, London, Esquire. The members for the county are given at page 150.

Waterford, as before-stated, is an episcopal See; it was founded originally about the close of the eleventh century, consolidated with the See of Lismore in 1363, and recently with Cashel and Emly. The cathedral of the Holy Trinity, commonly called Christ Church (and the parochial church), is a handsome structure, partly built with the materials of the old cathedral: the tower, which is lofty and ornamented, rises from the west end. The interior, neat and well kept, is furnished with a good organ, and contains a few interesting monuments. The bishop's palace, situated on the south side of the area in which the cathedral stands, is a handsome stone building, with a fine doric portico. There are three other churches, Saint Patrick's, Saint Olave's and the Abbey Church. The latter, situated on the opposite side of the river, is a very neat erection, with a tower, and forms a pleasing object from the parade, which it immediately faces. There are four places of worship for Roman Catholics. The cathedral of the Holy Trinity is, in its interior, perhaps, the most elegant chapel in Ireland. The roof is supported by twelve large and elegantly proportioned pillars, surmounted by beautiful capitals; the exterior, it is to be regretted, was never wholly completed. The other places of worship are, chapels for Presbyterians, Baptists, Independents, Methodists and a Friends' Meeting-house. A college, called Saint John's College, was erected by the Right Rev. Dr. Power, for the education of young men for the Roman Catholic ministry; attached to which is a school, for lay boarders and day scholars. The market days are Wednesday and Saturday; fairs, May 4th, June 24th, and October 25th. The population of the City of Waterford, by the parliamentary returns for 1841, was 23,216, but, including those parts of the parishes lying without the city and the municipal boundary, and also other parts transferred to the barony of Gaultiere, the population of Waterford and its suburbs numbers about 35,000 inhabitants.
