

CRUMLIN AND GLENNAVY.

CRUMLIN is a post and fair town, in the parish of Camlin, barony of Massareene, county of Antrim, 98 miles north from Dublin, 13 w. by s. from Belfast, 11 s. n. e. from Lisburn, 12 s. n. e. from Lurgan, and 7 s. from Antrim; situated on the road between the two last named places, and two miles and a half east of the head of a bay of Lough Neagh. On the Carrick, which skirts the town, and from which river its name is a corruption, are the extensive corn and flour mills of Messrs. Macaulay & Son, the only branch of importance connected with the place. From the situation of the town, near Lough Neagh, it derives a facility of communication by water with Belfast, Newry, Antrim, Magherafelt, and other towns. Petty sessions are held once a fortnight, and a station of the constabulary police force is established here. The parish church was destroyed by the army of James II, in 1699, and its ruins, which are very interesting, remain a monument of the

sacrilegious act. The Presbyterians and Unitarians have each a place of worship, and there are two free schools and a dispensary. One of the schools was built and endowed by Major-General the Honble. Sir H. R. Pakenham, of Langford Lodge; the other is under the National Board of Education. Fairs the first Monday monthly for cattle, pigs, and sheep. Camlin parish contained, in 1841, 2,586 inhabitants, and Crumlin town 568 of that number.

GLENNAVY, or *Lynavy*, is a post village and parish, in the same barony and county as Crumlin, between two and three miles south from that town, on the road to Lurgan and Lisburn. With the exception of bleaching in the parish, there is no business but that connected with agriculture. The places of worship are the parish church, a neat edifice, with a tower and clock, and a Methodist chapel. Population of the parish 3,854, including 510 inhabitants of the village.

DONAGHADEE AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

DONAGHADEE is a market town and sea-port and a parish, in the barony of Ards, county of Down, 121 miles N. by E. from Dublin, 19 E. by N. from Belfast, 9 E. N. E. from Newtownards, and 6 E. by S. from Bangor; situated on the shore of the Irish channel: it is the nearest port to Scotland, being 24 miles from Portpatrick, the passage to which is generally made in three hours, by steam vessels, which pass between the two ports daily. The town consists of several streets, which

are wide and well kept; the situation is pleasant and healthy, the inhabitants respectable, and provisions are very reasonable. That part of the town next the shore is built in the form of a crescent, and the shape, with the whiteness of the houses, gives the place a very pleasing appearance. The natural harbour is small, but has been improved greatly by the erection of piers, and at the extremity of the southernmost one is a light house, having a stationary red light. The first stone

of the harbour was laid by the Marquess of Downshire, on the 1st of August, 1821. The depth of water at the ebb of spring tides, on the land side, is from twelve to fourteen feet, it then deepens gradually toward the extreme end of the piers, where there is eighteen feet at low water; the rise of the tide at spring tides is from thirteen to sixteen feet, according to the state of wind and weather. In addition to its business as a port, Donaghadee possesses all the advantages connected with a pleasant bathing place, having a fine beach, good lodging houses, baths, and other requisites for the comfort and accommodation of visitors. A constabulary police station is established here, and Donaghadee is the head of a coast guard district, under the control of a resident inspecting commander. It is a creek to the port of Belfast. The principal imports are coal and timber, and its exports consist chiefly of live cattle and pigs. In the town and neighbourhood many industrious females are employed in embroidering muslin, chiefly for the Glasgow houses. Petty sessions are held in the court house every Wednesday; a manor

court before the scueschal occasionally, for debts to the amount of 40s.; and a court leet annually, in May.

The church is a large cruciform structure, with a lofty tower at its western end. The other places of worship are two meeting-houses for Presbyterians and a Wesleyan Methodist chapel. The charitable institutions consist of a dispensary, a clothing charity, supported from a bequest by Dr. Sempel; a charity school, endowed by the late Countess Mount Alexander; and Sabbath schools connected with the places of worship. At the northern end of the town is a Danish rath—a mount of considerable height, from the summit of which a beautiful prospect of the town and surrounding country, with a distant view of the Scotch coast and the Copeland Isles, is commanded. Within a mile of the town is Ballywilliam, the elegant cottage residence of the Rev. H. Leslie. The market is held on Wednesday. Fairs June 9th, July 4th, August 16th, October 22nd, and the second Wednesday in December. The population of the parish, in 1841, was 8,557, and the town and port 3,151 of that number.
