buildings in Kilrea and the neighbourhood have nearly  
all been erected under the superintendence of Mr.  
James Turnbull, a talented architect, of Newtown-  
limavady. About a mile and a half to the north of  
Kilrea are some picturesque ruins of the ancient castle  
of Movagh, which, during the parliamentary war,  
was garrisoned for Charles, but was speedily reduced

by Cromwell's troops, and finally dismantled. The  
general market is held on Wednesday, and one, for  
linen and flax, on the second and fourth Wednesday,  
monthly. Fairs for cattle, &c., are held also on the  
second Wednesday in each month. The population of  
Kilrea parish, in 1841, was 4,227, inclusive of 1,191  
inhabitants of the town.

# KILREA,

A MARKET town and a parish, the latter partly in  
the barony of Coleraine, but chiefly in that of Loughins-  
holme, county of Londonderry, 127 and 138 miles res-  
pectively, by different routes, N. from Dublin, 40 N. W.  
from Belfast, 35 S. E. from Londonderry, 15 S. S. E.  
from Coleraine, 12½ N. from Castle Dawson, and 7½  
N. W. from Portglenone, lying on the roads leading res-  
pectively from Coleraine to Portglenone and Castle  
Dawson, and from Garvagh to Ballymoney. The town,  
which is the property of the Mercers' Company, Lon-  
don, and is situated on the western shore of the river  
Bann, consists of four principal streets and a square;  
in the south-eastern angle of the latter is a public foun-  
tain, from which the inhabitants are supplied with  
water; and in the neighbourhood is an exten-  
sive bog, which furnishes them with fuel. The  
of yarn, and the weaving of linen, are carried  
rally through the district; and there are some con-  
siderable merchants, connected with these branches,  
resident in the town. A new market house and linen  
hall, recently erected, are convenient and ornamental  
buildings. The river is navigable for lighters from  
Belfast and Newry, through Lough Neagh, to Portna,

about a mile distant from the town; and the stream is  
crossed by a substantial stone bridge, of seven arches,  
forming a communication between this neighbourhood  
and the county of Antrim, with which a great inter-  
course is maintained. The river at Portna is much  
resorted to in the summer, for taking trout and eels,  
with which the Bann abounds. Mr. Moore's hotel is  
conveniently situated for those attracted hither for such  
purpose, and is a comfortable and respectable house—  
so is Mr. Hunter's, the other principal hotel. Petty  
sessions are held monthly, or oftener, before the local  
and county magistrates, and a manorial court as fre-  
quently, before Mr. Henderson, seneschal of the manor,  
for the recovery of small debts.

The parish church, erected [at] the expense of the  
Mercers' Company, is a beautiful structure, with a lofty  
spire, containing a good clock. A Roman Catholic  
chapel, situated a short distance from the town, and a  
Presbyterian meeting-house, are the other places of  
worship. There are schools for the gratuitous instruc-  
tion of both sexes, under Erasmus Smith's foundation,  
and others, toward the support of which the Company  
before referred to are liberal contributors. The modern
