

KING'S COURT,

A MARKET town, in the parish of Banisken, barony of Clonchee, county of Cavan, is 47 miles N. W. from Dublin, 14 N.E. from Virginia, 12 N.W. from Nobber, 7½ S.E. from Shercock, the same distance east from Bailieborough and west from Carrickmacross, lying on the road between the two last named towns, and on that leading from Dublin to Clones, about a mile and a half from the junction of the counties of Cavan, Meath, and Monaghan. It consists of one long street, spacious but irregular, about the middle of which is a convenient and neat market-house, with a good clock. With the exception of its extensive corn market, the trade of the place is unimportant, and unmarked by any prominent branch. Near to the town is Cabra Castle, the seat of the proprietor, Colonel Pratt, a baronial castellated mansion in the Norman style of architecture, situated in an extensive and beautiful demesne. At the western extremity of the estate is the romantic and thickly-wooded glen of Cabra, of great depth and nearly a mile in length, through which rushes, in a sinuous course,

a rapid mountain torrent, over beds of rocks, forming several picturesque cascades. Part of the woods of Cabra climb a lofty hill, the summit of which is crowned with the ruins of an ancient castle, commanding a rich view over several counties. Petty sessions are held every alternate Tuesday; and a constabulary force is stationed in the town.

The parish church, a neat structure, with a square tower, a Roman Catholic chapel, and one for Wesleyan Methodists, are the places of worship; a dispensary, first opened in 1801, is the principal charity. Mainly by the public spirited efforts of the proprietor of the corn exchange, Mr. Birmingham, who had to struggle against a powerful opponent at a cost to him of several thousand pounds, a market, for the sale of corn every Tuesday and Thursday, was established in 1818, which has continued ever since, the supply being about 50,000 barrels a year: this is in addition to the usual weekly market on Tuesday for provisions of every kind. Fairs are held the first Tuesday monthly. Population 1,614.

LARNE,

A MARKET town and sea-port, partly in the parish of Inver, barony of Lower Belfast, but chiefly in the parish of its name, barony of Upper Glenarm, county of Antrim, is 123 miles N. by E. from Dublin, 22 S. from Belfast, 20 S.E. from Antrim, 12 S. from Carrickfergus, and 10 S. S. E. from Glenarm; lying on the road from the last named town to Belfast, at the head of Lough Larne, on the coast of the North Channel, in the Irish Sea. The town, which was originally called *Inver*, is divided into the old and new towns; the latter consisting chiefly of one long and regular street, the houses of which are of stone and well built; but the streets of the other section are neither so spacious or so well paved. On a peninsula, called the Curran, stand the ruins of Oldfleet Castle; and on the road to it are the remains of a little chapel called Clondumales. The castle is supposed to have been erected by one of the Bissetts, a powerful Scotch family, in the time of Henry III. At this spot Edward Bruce landed in 1315, with the vain and ambitious design of making himself King of Ireland; causing much bloodshed, and producing many dreadful calamities to the English settlers in this part of the Kingdom. The port possessed at one time a comparatively high importance, but it has suffered a serious diminution of its consequence by the rise and rapid progress of the trade of Belfast. The largest shipments, perhaps, from the harbour are of lime; but these have little influence on the town. There are some good quays, on both sides of the lough, about a mile from the town, the water not being of sufficient

depth to float vessels further up. The linen and bleach-
ing business is carried on; but here again Belfast steps
in, and is continually diminishing this branch of com-
merce. The neighbourhood is exceedingly pleasant,
and the land of the district fertile, but rather deficient
in wood; and, in the summer season, Larne receives
many visitants, attracted by its advantages as a salu-
brious retreat and well adapted bathing place. Petty
sessions are held every alternate week, and a court
for the manor of Glenarm every six weeks. A con-
stabulary police force has been established in the town,
and there is also a coast guard station belonging to the
Carrickfergus district.

The church was repaired and much altered in 1819,
previous to which it had some interesting specimens of
ancient architecture. The other places of worship are
a neat Roman Catholic chapel, erected in 1832, and
three Presbyterian meeting-houses. The benevolent
and remedial institutions comprise national and con-
gregational schools, one for infants, a union work-
house, and a fever hospital. In a short road, leading
from the east to the north of the town, is a shalybeate
spring; and on the shore of the Lough, near the town,
are some curious petrefactions, of a blue colour, appa-
rently the result of a spring issuing from a bank above
high-water mark. The weekly provision market is
held on Wednesday, and for yarn, flax, and cattle on
the first Monday in each month. Fairs July 31st and
December 1st. The parish of Larne contained, in 1841,
3,223 inhabitants, and the town 3,315 of that number.
