LURGAN AND MOIRA.

LURGAN is a thriving market town, in the parish of
 Shankill, barony of Oneilland East, county of Armagh,
 85 miles N. from Dublin, 60 S. S. E. from Coleraine, 22
 S. W. from Belfast, 19 S. from Antrim, 17 N. E. by E.
 from Armagh, 14 W. S. W. from Lisburn, 12 S. by W. from
 Crumlin, 9 N. N. W. from Banbridge, and 5½ N. E. by E.
 from Portadown; elegantly situated about three miles
 south of the south-east corner of Lough Neagh, and
 near the line of the Ulster railway, for which the town
 is a station. The surrounding country is flat, fertile,
 and luxuriant, populous, and replete with evidences of
 industry, and consequent comfort and respectability.
 The principal street, which, indeed, is the principal part
 of the town, extends, for nearly a mile, along the Bel-
 fast and Armagh road, and is spacious, airy, well-built,
 remarkably clean, and may really be termed handsome.
 That which may be considered the suburban part of
 Lurgan is extensive and populous, for numerous lines
 of houses and detached dwellings stand along nearly
 all the radiating roads, and form, as it were, villages for
 a considerable distance. Lurgan-Castle demesne, the
 seat of the Right Hon. Lord Lurgan, proprietor of the
 town, extends along the whole of the north-east of it,
 and the entrance is by an elegant lodge from near the
 centre of the street. The mansion has been re-built
 lately in the Elizabethan style, with beautiful free-stone
 brought from Scotland. The grounds, which are gene-
 rously thrown open to the public, are richly embellished
 with thriving plantations, reflected in a fine sheet of
 water, which abounds with various water-fowl, and is
 encompassed by a well-kept gravel walk. In the square
 or market-place stands the court-house, a handsome
 building of stone, and the brown linen hall is a spacious
 building, erected in 1825. The linen and muslin ma-
 nufacture is the staple of Lurgan, and in producing the
 variety of fabrics, as cambrics, lawns, diapers, damasks,
 &c. a large proportion of the population of the town
 and its vicinity are employed; while some of the
 establishments of the yarn and linen merchants are
 extensive. Two noted breweries, and the hotels, are
 the other principal establishments—among the latter,
 Moore's Commercial and Family Hotel, in Main-street,
 is one of the best and most comfortable inns in the
 county. The Belfast Banking Company, the Northern
 Banking Company, the Provincial Bank, and the Ulster
 Bank, have each a branch in operation here, and there
 is a savings' bank admirably and beneficially conducted.
 A facility of intercourse with Belfast is afforded by
 Lough Neagh and the Lurgan navigation. The general
 quarter sessions of the county are held in Lurgan, and

petty sessions every Friday; and a section of the con-
 stabulary police is stationed in the town.

The parish church of Shankill is a handsome struc-
 ture, with a finely-proportioned octagonal spire, con-
 taining a good clock. The interior of the church is
 neatly fitted up, and furnished with a fine-toned organ.
 The Roman Catholic parochial chapel is a neat Gothic
 building. There are places of worship for Presbyterians,
 the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan, Primitive, and
 the New Connexion of Methodists. The free educa-
 tional establishments are a subscription school, one for
 infants, and one of the church society's schools. The
 other charities are a dispensary and a union workhouse.
 The market, which is held on Friday, is abundantly
 supplied with provisions, and is besides a considerable
 one for the manufactures of the town and district.
 Fairs August 5th and November 22nd. The population
 of the town, in 1841, was 4,677.

MOIRA, or *Saint Inns of Moira*, anciently called
Moirath, is a post town and parish, in the barony of
 Lower Iveagh, county of Down, about five miles N. E.
 from Lurgan, situated on the road from Belfast to
 Armagh, and within half a mile of the Ulster rail-
 way. The town, though small, is well-built and remark-
 ably clean, and consists of one long spacious street, con-
 taining the court-house, a large and handsome building.
 A manor court is held in it, every three weeks, for the
 recovery of debts under £5., and petty sessions every
 alternate Monday. This was formerly part of the pa-
 rish of Magheralin, and was made a distinct parish
 about 1725, shortly after which the church was erected
 at the joint expense of Sir John Rawdon and the Earl
 of Hillsborough: it is a large and handsome Gothic
 edifice, with a square tower, surmounted by a spire,
 and from its situation, above the town, forms a conspi-
 cuous and picturesque object in this rich and well
 planted district. Moira gives the title of earl in the
 peerage of Ireland, to the noble family of Campbell-
 Rawdon-Hastings, Earls of Loudon, in the peerage of
 Scotland, and Marquesses of Hastings, in the peerage
 of the United Kingdom. Sir John Rawdon was created
 Baron Rawdon in 1750, and advanced to the dignity of
 Earl Moira in 1761. His son Francis, who succeeded
 to his titles in 1793, is well known to history both as a
 soldier and a statesman, in the reigns of George III
 and George IV, and was Governor-General of India in
 the reign of the latter monarch. Fairs the first Thurs-
 days in February, May, August, and November. The
 parish of Moira contained, in 1841, 4,147 inhabitants,
 and the town 823 of that number.
