MOVILLE,

A SMALL market town, in the parish of Lower
Moville, barony of Inishowen, county of Donegal, is
19 miles N. N. E. from Londonderry, and about 5½ s. w.
of Inishowen Head; situated at the south-eastern ex-
tremity of its parish, on the western shore of Lough
Foyle, on the road coastways between the two places
before-mentioned. A clever work on the towns of
Ireland thus notices Moville—'It is sheltered from the
westerly gales by the Squire's Cars and Craignamaddy
mountains; it possesses good bathing ground within
the strongly marine waters of Lough Foyle; it looks
out upon a wide sweep of beautiful scenery athwart
the bosom and around the shores of the lough; and, in
general it has already acquired a high character, and is
likely to acquire a still higher one as a very eligible
sea-bathing resort for the citizens of Londonderry and
the inhabitants of the circumjacent country.' The town
is clean, possesses every accommodation for visitors in

lodging-houses, baths, and hotels. Among the latter
Mr. McConnell's Commercial Hotel is an excellent
house, and commands beautiful views of the coast, and
over the counties of Londonderry, Antrim and Donegal,
with the lively addition of steamers passing to and fro
daily on the lough. Three miles hence is the fort of
Green Castle, furnished with the, at present, unneces-
sary means of defending the entrance of the lough.

The places of worship are the parish church (situated
two miles hence), a Roman Catholic chapel, and a
Presbyterian meeting-house. A dispensary, two schools
under the national board, and one of the Ladies' Hiber-
nian Society, are the charitable institutions. In the
school-house of the last named, divine service is per-
formed every Sunday evening. The market is held on
Thursday, and fairs on the 28th of the months of January,
April, July, and October. Population of the parish, in
1841, 6,061, including 595 inhabitants of the town.

MOY, CHARLEMONT AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

MOY is a small market town and ecclesiastical dis-
trict, partly in the barony of Oneilland West, county
of Armagh, but chiefly in that of Dungannon, county of
Tyrone, 86 miles s. w. from Dublin, 40 s. w. from Bel-
fast, 26 n. w. from Newry, 17 w. from Portadown, 6½
n. w. from Armagh, 6 s. s. e. from Dungannon, and 4½
n. w. from Loughgall; situated at the eastern verge of
the county, on the river Blackwater, on the road from
Armagh to Coleraine. It was designed in the year
1764, by the late Earl of Charlemont, the proprietor,
after the plan of Marengo, in Italy, and is, for its size,
one of the neatest and most thriving towns in Ireland.
It consists of a handsome rectangular area called Char-
lemont-square, intersected by two parallel lines of trees,
with four streets branching off at the east and west.
Two quays, on the river, were erected by the Charle-
mont family, with extensive stores, and the Blackwater
being navigable from Lough Neagh for lighters of sixty
tons burthen, an immediate communication is formed
with Belfast and Newry by the Lagan and Newry ca-
nals, and with Lough Erne, by the Ulster canal. A
handsome market-place, with court-house and news-
room, was erected, by the present earl, in 1828; petty
sessions are held in the former every Monday fortnight,
and a court for the mayor of Charlemont in May and
November. A constabulary barrack adjoins the Market-
place. In the immediate neighbourhood of the town
and of Charlemont are several extensive linen manu-
facturers, giving employment to upwards of three
thousand looms. The great advantages afforded by the
navigation causes a considerable trade in agricultural
produce, building materials, yarn, coal, salt, &c.; and it
is to be expected that the Great Northern Railway to
Coleraine, which will pass contiguous to the town, will
not only increase its immediate local business, but will
develop the internal resources of the country, and
further facilitate the trade of the district.

The church, an elegant structure in the early English
style, with a handsome square tower, was built at the
cost of £1,569., and it has since been considerably en-
larged. A large Roman Catholic chapel, with a hand-
some Doric front, was erected in 1833, by the Rev. Dr.
Montague. The other places of worship are for Inde-
pendents, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists.
There are infants' and sewing schools, under the pa-
tronage of the Charlemont family, and one under the
National Board of Education. On an adjacent hill is
Roxborough House, the beautiful residence of Lord
Charlemont, originally commenced in 1774, by his uncle,
the Hon. Francis Caulfield. The fine plantations, taste-
fully laid out grounds, and elegant entrance, greatly
enhance the general appearance of the town, while a
handsome tower to the east is a picturesque feature in
its beauty. The market is on Friday, which, besides
articles of general consumption, is a considerable one
for grain. On the first Friday of every month is held
one of the best attended horse fairs in the north of
Ireland. Population of the town, in 1841, 857.
