NEWTOWNARDS,

WITH GREY ABBEY AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

NEWTOWNARDS, or NEWTOWNARDES, is a market town (formerly a parliamentary borough), and a parish—the latter partly in the barony of Lower Castlereagh, but chiefly in that of Ardes, county of Down, 111 miles N. E. from Dublin, 9 1/2 E. from Belfast, 8 s. w. by s. from Donaghadee, and 4 1/2 s. by w. from Bangor; beautifully situated near the northern extremity of Lough Strangford, well sheltered on the north and west by contiguous hills. This place has been celebrated from a very early period for the number of religious foundations in its immediate neighbourhood. In 1244 Walter de Burgh, Earl of Ulster, founded a monastery here for Dominican friars, but no vestige of the building now remains. On the north side of the town was the cell of Kiltonga, which has been supposed to have originally given name to the parish; and within five miles were the abbey of Bangor, Hollywood, Moville, Grey Abbey, Cumber, and the Black Priory. James I. after the forfeiture of the surrounding territory by O'Neil's rebellion, granted lands and the neighbouring monasteries to Sir James Hamilton and Sir Hugh Montgomery, from whom they passed to the Mount-Alexander family, and from them by exchange into that of Londonderry, and the present Marquess is now the proprietor of Newtownards and a large extent of country round. The town consists of one spacious square, with several wide streets leading from it and others of inferior note diverging from the principal ones in different directions. In the square, a handsome rectangular area, stands the town-hall, a large and rather elegant structure, in the Grecian Doric style, erected in 1770, by the first Marquess of Londonderry: it contains an elegant suite of assembly rooms, and other apartments, and beneath is the market offices, stables, &c. Nearly in the centre of the town stands the lofty and beautiful pedestal of an ancient cross, erected in 1636, ornamented with armorial sculptures, defaced by the rebels in 1653, and restored by the inhabitants in 1666. The town has been greatly improved by the Marquess of Londonderry, who has a magnificent seat within three miles of it, which is now being greatly enlarged and embellished in a princely style. Mr. and Mrs. Hall, in their tour through Down county, thus notice the environs of Newtownards—'We encountered only admirably constructed farm houses, well furnished with barns and byres, corn fields and pasture lands, the natural riches of which had been enhanced by industry and well applied science; every dwelling bore numerous tokens of comfort; every peasant looked cheerful and happy; and we found, by after inquiry, that these signs of prosperity were not merely superficial, but that the noble

owner of the soil, and his agents, under his directions, invariably act under the principle of 'Live and let live.' The town itself is one of the most attractive in the north of Ireland, as to neatness, regularity, architecture, and convenience. The weaving of muslin employs a large number of the male population, and the embroidering of muslin, for the manufacturers of Glasgow, a considerable number of females. About a mile from the town, convenient to the road leading to Bangor, are two extensive lead mines, held on lease from the marquess by two spirited companies; the ore, which is very rich, is shipped, at Bangor, for Flint, in North Wales, where it is smelted. There are likewise, in the neighbourhood, several prolific quarries, producing stone little inferior to that of Portland. The shops of the town enjoy an extensive retail trade, and large sales of agricultural produce are made at the weekly markets. The 'Commercial Inn' here is a comfortable and well regulated house. By the charter of James I the corporation consists of a provost, twelve free burgesses, and an indefinite number of freemen, but the body has not exercised any municipal functions since 1824. A mayor court is held before a seneschal appointed by the Marquess of Londonderry, every third Saturday, for the recovery of debts not exceeding £10., and a court meet annually, at which various officers are appointed for the manor, and a peace constable for the borough. The general sessions for the county are held in June and December, and petty sessions on the first and third Saturdays in every month. The ancient church, erected by Sir Hugh Montgomery, has been converted into a court-house by the marquess, and in it the above courts are held. The corporation, under their charter, continued to return two members to the Irish Parliament until the Union, when the borough was disfranchised. The parish church, erected in 1817, is an elegant cruciform edifice, with a lofty and finely proportioned spire. The Roman Catholic chapel is a small but neat building; and the Presbyterian meeting-houses, of which there are three, are convenient and neat edifices. The other places of worship are chapels for Unitarians, the Wesleyan and New Connexion of Methodists and a Covenanters' meeting-house. The principal benevolent institutions are a fever hospital and dispensary, a house of industry, a union workhouse, and public schools; among the latter is a large one for children of both sexes, supported by the Londonderry family. The market, which is held on Saturday, is abundantly supplied with provisions of all kinds; there are large markets or fairs on the second Saturday in every month,
