

RATHFRYLAND,

RATHFRYLAND, is a small market-town, partly in the parish of Drumballyrone, but chiefly in that of Drumgath, barony of Upper Iveagh, county of Down, 72 miles N. from Dublin, 31½ S. S. W. from Belfast, 21 W. from Downpatrick, 9 W. by S. from Castledillon, the same distance S. S. E. from Banbridge, rather more than 8 N. E. by E. from Newry, and 1 N. from Hilltown; situated at the intersection of the roads from Newry to Downpatrick, from Warren Point to Dromore, from Rostrevor to Lisburn, and from Killeel to Banbridge. It stands on the acclivities of a small hill, and consists of five principal streets, which radiate downward from a tolerably spacious square, towards the five roads, which meet at its site. The summit of the hill, which commands an extensive view of the surrounding country, is crowned by the ruins of an old castle, anciently one of the fortified residences of the Magennis, lords of Iveagh. The town was founded soon after the restoration, by Alderman Hawkins, of London, to whom Charles II. granted the whole of the extensive manor, in requital of important services: it is now the property of his lineal descendant, General Meade. A considerable business is carried on with the adjacent district of

a general nature, and the town itself is the residence of several respectable families. At a short distance from it is a Spa, strongly chalybeate, and deemed efficacious in scorbutic complaints. The market-house is a good building, in the centre of the square: the upper part contains accommodation for the magistrates, who hold courts of petty sessions every third Friday monthly. The parish church of Drumgath, situated on the south side of the square, is a small neat edifice, with a tower; and the Roman Catholic chapel is a spacious building; the Presbyterians have three meeting-houses; the Covenanters and Society of Friends' one each, and the Methodists have a chapel. The charitable establishments are public schools for children of both sexes, and a dispensary. The markets are held on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday, principally for flax and linen. The fairs (which are regulated according to the Old Style), are on the second Wednesday in February, the second Wednesday in April, the Wednesday next after Trinity Sunday, the third Wednesday in July, the second Wednesday in September, and the last Wednesday in November. The town contained, in 1841, 2,183 inhabitants.

RATHMELTON,

RATHMELTON, is a pleasant, little market-town, in the parish of Aughnish, barony of Kilmacrenan, county of Donegal; 151 miles N. S. W. from Dublin, 31 N. from Donegal, 21 N. S. from Strabane, 13 W. by S. from Londonderry, 7 N. S. E. from Litterkenney, 6 S. S. W. from Rathmullen, and the same distance east from Kilmacrenan; situated on the road from Strabane to Rathmullen, on the southern bank of the river Lagan (or Lennon), a little above its entrance into Lough Swilly. The town presents in its interior an agreeable appearance, indicative of comfort and respectability; and the neighbourhood of it abounds in beautiful views from various points. The vale of the Lagan is picturesque, and finely wooded, and the immediate environs of the town present scenes which cannot but interest the tourist. Immediately below the town, at the estuary of the river, is a small quay, up to which, vessels of one hundred and fifty tons burthen can come at high water, and others, almost of any tonnage, can approach within half a mile of the town. The trade in corn is considerable, and there are some large mills in the vicinity. The curing of bacon is extensively carried on by Mr. Kelly here; and at the western end of the town, are the chymical works of Messrs Ward and Smith, where are manufactured muriate and sulphate of potash, iodine, and Glauber's and alkali salts. The only other business establishment of any note, is Trilley's Hotel, an excellently conducted house. A court of petty sessions is held on the second Thursday of every month; and a constabulary police force is established in the town.

The parish church of Aughnish, situated in the town, is a very handsome edifice, with a tower. The Presbyterians have three meeting-houses; the Methodists one, and the Roman Catholics have a chapel, within a mile of the town. A dispensary and fever hospital, and parochial and Presbyterian schools, are the benevolent institutions. A reading-room is established in Bridge street with a permanent secretary. The market is held on Tuesday, and the fairs May 20th, July 17th, and November 16th. The town contained, in 1841, 1,428 inhabitants.
