ENNISCORTHY AND FERNS.

ENNISCORTHY is a market and borough town,
 in the parish of Saint Mary, Enniscorthy, barony of
 Scarawalsh, county of Wexford, 78 miles south from
 Dublin, 19 south-west from Gorry, and 15 north-west
 from Wexford; situated on the banks of the Slaney,
 a navigable river, abounding with trout and salmon,
 which is crossed by a stone bridge of three arches.
 The castle of Enniscorthy, which had been in ruins
 for upwards of a century, and stands in the centre of
 the town, has been repaired at a considerable expense,
 and is now occupied by the Rev. John W. Charters.
 This castle, in 1798, was captured by the insurgents,
 who converted it into a prison, wherein were perpe-
 trated many cruel deeds. The Earl of Portsmouth, who
 is the proprietor, possesses considerable property in
 this town and neighbourhood, and whose funds contri-
 buted largely towards the widening of the bridge, and
 the erection of two spacious quays, each of which are
 500 feet in length. George Roberts, Esq. is his lord-
 ship's managing agent. Vinegar Hill, so memorable
 in the annals of 1798, lifts itself up above the town; the
 prospect from the summit is wide and picturesque.
 It was from an encampment upon this hill that the insur-
 gents descended to attack the town, and, as its garrison
 numbered but 290 men, these were overpowered, though
 resisting stoutly; then followed a scene of horror—the
 town was fired, and most of its denizens fled for their lives
 through smoke and flames, leaving four hundred and
 seventy-eight houses in ruins behind them. It was at
 Vinegar Hill that the rebels afterwards met with a
 signal overthrow. That section of the town on the
 west bank of the river is Saint Mary's; that on the
 east is called Temple Shannon. A new road has been
 constructed to Wexford, shortening the distance one
 mile, and avoiding the hills. Besides the great trade
 in provisions, butter, bacon, coal, corn, and flour, there
 is a large brewery, conducted by Messrs. J. and T.
 Pounder, called Mill Park Brewery, and there are several
 flour mills and tanneries in the town. Branches of
 the National and Provincial Banks of Ireland were
 established here in 1835. Enniscorthy was incorporated
 by James I. and another charter was granted to the
 burgesses by James II, by which the corporation was
 styled 'The portriever, free burgesses, and commonalty
 of the borough of Enniscorthy,' and consists of a port-
 riever, twelve burgesses, and a commonalty. The port-
 riever and burgesses sent two members to the Irish
 parliament until the legislative union, since which
 period it has ceased to be represented. A court for the
 recovery of small debts is held weekly in the market-
 house, and sessions twice a year in a convenient court-
 house, attached to which is a bridewell. The union
 workhouse occupies a conspicuous and airy site.
 The parish church of Saint Mary was pulled down,
 and a new structure erected upon its site; it is a cap-
 tious stone building, in the early English style, with a
 tower and spire, together one hundred and fifty-six
 feet in height. The church, which contains eight hun-
 dred sittings, is a great ornament to the town; the living
 is a vicarage, in the gift of the bishop of the diocese.
 The newly-erected Roman Catholic chapel is an elegant
 structure, and is the cathedral of the diocese of Ferns,
 the bishop whereof resides in the vicinage of the town.
 There is a second chapel also for the Roman Catholics,
 one for Wesleyan Methodists, and a meeting-house
 for the Society of Friends. A school, founded by
 Erasmus Smith, for children of both sexes, an infants'
 school, in the same capacious and handsome building;
 a Lancasterian school, and a female school in the
 'Convent of the presentation,' are the free educational
 institutions. Daphne House school, conducted by Mr.
 Ormsby, is an establishment wherein the sons of the
 gentry exclusively receive an education of a superior
 character, both intellectually and morally; the situation
 of the ancient mansion is singularly picturesque. There
 are, besides several respectable private seminaries. The
 remains of the Franciscan friary, on the banks of the
 river, is a fine ruin. Market days, Tuesday, Thurs-
 day, and Saturday. Fairs January 21st, February 21st,
 March 21st, April 25th, May 10th, June 7th, July 5th,
 August 26th, September 19th, October 10th, November
 15th, and December 21st. The population of the town,
 in 1841, was 7,016.

FERNS, the seat of a diocese, but an inconsiderable
 town as to population and size, is 7½ miles north from
 Enniscorthy. The ruins of its once formidable castle,
 surmounting the hill on the sides of which the village
 reposes, the cathedral, and the episcopal palace, denote
 that this now little and, otherwise, mean town was
 once a place of importance, and even now gives its
 name to a bishop's See, both of the established church
 and of the Roman Catholic hierarchy. The present
 cathedral is of modern date, but is in contact with a
 more venerable structure; it contains a monument to
 the memory of Dr. Preston, Bishop of Kildare, and
 one to Saint Mogue, who is said to have been the
 founder of this bishopric in 601, now annexed to Ossory
 and Leighlin. The episcopal palace was erected by
 Bishop Cleaver, afterwards Archbishop of Dublin, and
 was much damaged by the insurgents in 1798. The
 demesne is very beautiful, to which the ruins of the
 ancient abbey give great interest. Near this ruin is a
 church, the steeple of which is of singular construction,
 the lower part being square and the upper round. The
 original castle was the rude palace of the kings of
 Leinster; this was supplanted by a fortress of great
 magnitude, erected by Earl Strongbow. After this
 latter had experienced many vicissitudes, it became
 occasionally the residence of the Bishop of Ferns.
 During the civil wars, in 1641, Sir Charles Coote sub-

dued it with the forces of the parliament, and it was
 afterwards dismantled. The Roman Catholic Bishop
 of Ferns resides at Enniscorthy. There is a Roman
 Catholic chapel and a dispensary in the town. Fairs
 are held February 11th, May 12th, September 4th, and
 October 29th. Population of the town 632.
