## PHILIPSTOWN

It is a small market town, in the parish of Killaderry and barony of Lower Philipstown, King's county, 48 miles w. by s. from Dublin, 121 w. by s. from Edenderry, and 8 s.e. from Tyrrell's Pass, situated on the southern bank of the Grand Canal communicating with Dublin. This town acquired its appellation in honour of Philip II, King of Spain, and consort of Mary, Queen of England, who erected this part of the county into shire ground, in the year 1557. At the eastern extremity is Forth Castle, where King Philip lodged during his tour through this part of the country. Philipstown consists of only one street, which is wide and well paved, and the houses are built in uniform order. Previous to the union it returned two members to the Irish parliament; but since the removal of the assizes from it to Tullamore, it has greatly declined in prosperity, which is to be regretted, as the manners of the inhabitants are courteous and hospitable. A handsome court-house, where the quarter sessions are held, and barracks, are the public buildings, besides the places of worship, which are the parish church and a Roman Catholic chapel. The only charitable institutions are a free school for thirty boys, supported from the charity funds left by Erasmus Smith, Esq. and a national school. The market is held on Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday, March 28th, May 15th, June 24th, August 17th, October 18th, and December 3rd. The population of the town, in 1841, was 1,489.

## NEWTOWN-MOUNT-KENNEDY AND DELGANY.

NEWTOWN-MOUNT-KENNEDY is a small town or village, in the parish and barony of Newcastle, county of Wicklow, 20 miles s. from Dublin, situated on the road between Wexford, Wicklow, and Dublin, and derives its name from Alderman Kennedy, who was knighted in the reign of Charles II. The neighbourhood abounds with beautiful scenery and seats of the opulent. The lovely demesne, called Woodstock, now the residence of the Bishop of Clogher, is about a mile and a half from the town.

The church, or rather chapel of the Establishment, is the only place of worship; it is a very ornamental building, with a pinnacled tower. There are two Catholic chapels a short distance from the town. A parochial school and an hospital and dispensary are supported here. In this town, during the insurrection of 1798, the insurgents met with a complete overthrow by a very inferior force. Fairs February 2nd, April 18th, June 29th, August 15th, October 30th, and December 21st. Population of the town, in 1841, 823.

DELGANY is a post village and parish, in the barony of Rathdown, and same county as Newtown-Mount-Kennedy, about 34 miles n. from that town. This charming little village owes its elegant arrangement to the taste of Mrs. Latouche, from the gates of whose sumptuous mansion of Bellevue it is a quarter of a mile only. This beautiful demesne contains an observatory two hundred feet by sixty-four, rich with rare plants, and a building called the octagon, standing on a rock to command the unrivalled prospect. Attached to the mansion is a girls' charity school. The church of Delgany was built in 1789, by Peter Latouche, Esq. from a design by Whitmore Davis; the style is Gothic, and at the west end of the church rises a steeple ninety feet high. Within the church is a monument to the memory of the Latouches, in white marble, by Noah Hickey; it is in height twenty-four feet, and thereon are sculptured a figure as large as life of David Latouche; one of Mrs. Latouche, holding a cornucopia; and three medallions, portraying David, Peter, and John Latouche. In the village are a dispensary and several schools—of the latter two are supported by Mrs. Latouche and Mrs. Cleaver. The parish contains 2,000 inhabitants, but the village only about 200.

## PORTARLINGTON

It is a market town and parliamentary borough, partly county, the smaller in that of King's; it is a station in the parish of Clonchorke, barony of Upper Phillips, upon the Dublin and Cachel railway, and a branch of town, King's county, but chiefly in the parish of Lea, the Grand Canal from Dublin passes close to the town. barony of Portlambinch, Queen's county, 41 miles s. w. from Dublin, 11 s. from Mayborough, and 6 s.e. from Mountmellick; seated on the banks of the Barrow, over a river called the present appellation is derived from which is a stone bridge. The stream divides the town into two unequal parts—the larger situated in Queen's and its prefix from a landing place on the river before
