OR AN ANALYTICAL VIEW OF—FIRST, THE PARISHES; SECONDLY, THE RELIGIOUS DENOMINATIONS; THIRDLY, THE PLACES OF PUBLIC WORSHIP; FOURTHLY, THE CLERGY.

FIRST,—THE PARISHES.

Dublin is divided, ecclesiastically, according to the scale of the Established Church, into nineteen parishes, exclusive of the Deanery of St. Patrick, and the parish of Grangegorman, viz: SS. Andrew's, Anne's, Audoen's, Bridget's, Catherine's, George's, James's, John's, Luke's, Mark's, Mary's, Michan's, Michael's, Nicholas' Within, Nicholas' Without, Paul's, Peter's, Thomas's, and Werburgh's:

Six of these, viz.—George's, Grangegorman, Mary's, Michan's, Paul's, and Thomas's, are on the North-side of the Liffey; the remainder are on the South.

The largest parish in Dublin, both as regards population and area, is St. Peter's, which contains 28,686 persons, and 87 Irish acres—the smallest, in like respects, is St. Nicholas' Within, which contains but 1,937 persons, and 2½ acres.

Those parishes nearest to the most ancient part of the city (the neighbourhood of Winetavernstreet) are the smallest; as they diverge from that point they progressively become larger: thus, for example, St. Peter's, which is one of the exterior parishes of the city, is, in itself, of greater extent than eight or nine parishes put together, which are adjacent to the most ancient part of Dublin alluded to.

*It may, perhaps, gratify the curious to state here, incidentally, that the only parish in Dublin which verifies the adage of having "the Church in the middle of it," is—Appels

According to the scale of the Roman Catholic Church, Dublin is divided into nine parishes, viz.—SS. Andrew's, Audoen's, Catherine's, James's, Michael's and John's, Michan's, Mary's, Nicholas's, and Paul's. Three of these, viz.—SS. Mary's, Michan's, and Paul's, are on the North-side of the Liffey; the other six are on the South-side.

The largest parish, is that of St. Mary, (which is a union of SS. Mary's, Thomas's, and George's,) and the smallest is St. Audoen's.
