were manufactured, but experience soon convinced the directors, that it would tend more to the prosperity of the factory, to make coarse lines for the export traile, and if a much more extensive supply, that can be obtained at present, could be furnished, the demand for coarse linens would still be unsatisfied. The increasing prosperity of this establishment, on a retrospect to its origin, is a proof convincing to the most sceptical, that nothing but exertion on the part of the higher orders is recussary to open a field of prosperity to this impoverished country. A weekly market for the sale of linen and yarn was established here on Friday the teath of October, 1823. To all, who are interested in the amelioration of the distresses of their country, this is an interesting sight, and a most useful example the merit of which is due in a great measure to the city of London committee, whose assistance has been of infinite utility to the establishment. An opinion has obtained, that the richest land only will produce flax; on the contrary, it should be cultivated after wheat, and it is a fact well ascertained, that the soil of this country is favourable for the production of this article equally with that of Holland and Silesia, to which places England and Scotland annually pay great sums, while this naturally favoured island might be rendered capable of furnishing it a abundance. The local committee, formed in 1809, established a dispensary, which was found so useful, that from the same source a fever hospital has been founded, which has proved of incalculable benefit, there being at that time no other in the county. This was at first considered to be a visionary scheme, under the idea that the peasantry would never be induced to take advanfor when the hospital has been full to excess, the sick have frequently been abandoned at the gate by their friends to force their reception into the hospital. A Dutch sieve manufactory for cleaning flax seed is another in addition to the many establishments of public utility, founded by the Countess Clengall, who is also patroness of a school built out of a donation from the Kildare-street Society (Dublin), and private the 20th of October, and the 7th of December.

The beautiful seats in the neighbourhood which here and there open to the view, contribute to diversify the variegated scenery of majestic mountains whose dusky summits exhibit a striking contrast to the verdant carpet expanding beneath their base. On an island in the river stands Cahir castle, erected by O'Connor, Ling of Thomond and monarch of Ireland, before the year 1142. This castle was subdued by George Carey in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and afterwards by Crommell.
