ROSCREA

Is an ancient town on the borders of the King's and Queen's Counties, in the county of Tipperary, 59 miles S. W. of Dublin, 40 N. of Clonmel, and 35 N.E. of Limerick. It was erected into a bishoprick in the year 620, by St. Cronan; but in the twelfth century was united to Kilfaloe. Some remains of the Cathedral may be seen in the beautiful tyle of the ninth century. Many it is a large stone ground called the century. Near it is a large stone cross, called the Shrine of St. Cronan, as well as one of the largest round towers in the kingdom, built of square stones, and in excellent preservation. Near this town the Danes met their first signal defeat; they had marched house, a bridewell, a free school, public shamples from Limerick and Connaught to surprise the inha-

bitants, then assembled at the great annual fair of Roscrea, which held fourteen days; but the people had notice of their approach, marched out to oppose them, and gave them so great an overthrow, that 4000 Danes by dead in the field, amougst whom was Olfin, their chief. In 1213 King John crected a large castle here, (being the bounds of the English pale) as a protection against the incursions of the natives. Roscrea is now a thriving trading town; it has a barrack for a regiment of foot, a large new church,
