# LARNE,

The neighbourhood of Larne is extremely pleasant, the land very fertile, and, as a summer retreat during the bathing season, surpassed by few in the north of Ireland. A market is held here for provisions on Wednesday, and for yarn, flax, and cattle on the first Monday in the month. The fairs are on the 31st of July and the first of December. Population about 3500.
