

nel, and freize, which formerly flourished here, is of but little, if any, importance. This town, it is anticipated, will participate beneficially by the improvements prosecuted in the navigation of the Shannon, a very considerable sum having been granted for the purpose, and for constructing a harbour, and building a bridge, &c.: while, for the accommodation of those attending the market, the proprietor of the town, C. M. St. George, Esq. in 1839, judiciously enclosed a convenient market square, comprising a good market-house and shambles. The government of the town is vested in the resident and county magistrates, who hold general sessions twice a year, and petty sessions once a fortnight; the assizes are also held in the town twice a year. handsome and commodious stone building, ornamented with four doric columns. The county gaol is spacious, convenient, and well regulated. The other public buildings, exclusive of the edifices for religion, are constabulary and military barracks, a union workhouse, and the county infirmary.

The places of worship are the parish church, a neat structure, with a spire; a Roman Catholic chapel, and a chapel each for Primitive and Wesleyan Methodists. There are two national schools, to one of which Mr. St. George liberally contributes £20. annually towards its support. The market is held on Thursday. Fairs, Jan. 18th, March 20th, June 6th, August 11th, Sep. 15th, October 22nd, November 21st, and December 16th. The town contained, in 1841, 1,984 inhabitants.

CASTLEBAR,

THE county town of Mayo, and prior to the Union a parliamentary borough, is a market town and parish, in the barony of Carra, 153 miles w. by s. from Dublin, 16 n.w. from Clare, 18 n. from Ballinrobe, 20 s. from Ballina, and 10 n.e. from Westport; situated on the river of Castlebar, which has its source in Lough Lanark, and at the junction of numerous roads leading into the contiguous counties. In 1798, Castlebar was in possession of the French, under General Humbert, who landed in Kilmunin Bay, on the 22nd August, and proceeding to Ballina, succeeded in reducing that town, and subsequently Castlebar, but on the approach of the Marquess Cornwallis, they retreated precipitately towards Sligo, and soon after surrendered themselves prisoners of war. The town consists of one principal street, nearly a mile in length, and a spacious green, from which diverge several smaller streets and lanes. The green, which is intersected by a gravelled promenade, overshadowed by fine trees, is surrounded by the principal public buildings; these, exclusive of the edifices for religious purposes, are a handsome court-house, a noble county gaol on the radiating plan, the military and constabulary barracks, a county infirmary, a dispensary, a union workhouse, and linen hall. The linen manufacture, formerly extensively carried on, has all but become extinct, and the trade here may now be said to be confined to a retail business conducted in the prin-

cipal street, where there are some well-stored shops. The assizes for the county are held here, and also general sessions twice a year; and the magistrates, to whom the government of the town is confided, assemble in petty session every Saturday. Foy's Hotel, in Ellison-street, is a very well-conducted house—there is, besides, another good inn, in Church-street. Two newspapers issue weekly from the Castlebar press, the 'Mayo Constitution,' on Tuesday, and the 'Telegraph,' on Wednesday.
The parish church is a handsome structure, in the later style of English architecture, with a lofty square embattled tower. It was erected in 1828, by aid of a gift of £2,000. from the Board of First Fruits. The Roman Catholic chapel is a spacious slated edifice. There is a place of worship for Wesleyan Methodists. Two free schools, one parochial, the other upon the national plan, afford instruction to a large number of children. At the head of Lough Lanark, near the town, is an ancient place of sepulture, commanding a fine view of the country and the distant mountains; and on the other side of the lake are the ruins of a fortified residence. The market is held on Saturday. Fairs May 11th, July 9th, September 16th, and November 18th. The parish (which is also called *Aglesh*) contained, by the census taken in 1841, 10,464 inhabitants, and the town 5,137 of that number.
