**DUNMORE,**

A SMALL, but ancient market town, in the parish of its name, which is partly in the barony of Half-Balmoe, but chiefly in that of Dunmore, county of Galway, is 134 miles w. from Dublin, and 9 s.e. from Tuam; situated in an exceedingly picturesque district, variegated by hill and dale, either in rich pasture or tillage. The public buildings, exclusive of the places of worship, consist of a market and court-house in the centre of the town (where petty sessions are held once a fortnight), a dispensary, and police barrack. The church forms a portion of the ancient monastery, said to have been founded by the Berminghams, barons

of Athenry. There is also a chapel for Roman Catholics. Bermingham Castle, a beautiful ruin, once the seat of that ancient family, is in the neighbourhood. A very fine kind of grit stone was formerly raised here in considerable quantities, and of various thickness, from the thinnest flag to the largest millstones, for which latter purpose the stone was held in great estimation. The town may be considered to derive its support from its well attended markets, on Monday and Thursday, and its fairs—the latter are held May 29th, July 10th, October 10th, and December 11th. Population, in 1841, 917.

**ELPHIN,**

AN episcopal and market town and parish, in the barony and county of Roscommon, 95 miles w. n. w. from Dublin, 22 w. n. w. from Longford, 15 n. from Roscommon, the like distance n.e. from Castlereagh, 10 e.s.e. from Boyle, 9 w. from Drumsna, and 7 n. n. w. from Strokestown; situated along the summit of a ridge nearly east and west. On approaching the town from the south or the south-east its appearance is pleasing, if not imposing; but this impression is quickly obliterated on becoming more intimately acquainted with its interior. The city, as it is styled, consists principally of one main street, tolerably wide, with but few good houses, no public building of any architectural consequence, nor trading establishment of any magnitude. We may, however, except the hotels, of which there are two—both posting-houses, and Haly's, in the Market-place, may be entered by the commercial gentleman with confidence in its accommodations. The bishop's palace, situated about a quarter of a mile from the church, is a spacious well-built structure, destitute of any positive elegance. Here the bishop resided prior to the union of Elphin, Ardagh, and Kilmore, into one diocese, after which the prelate removed to the latter town. The cathedral of Saint Mary which, for more than a century, has been used as the parish church, is a plain modern building, about eighty feet long by twenty-eight broad, with an ancient square tower. The interior commends itself to the visitor by its neatness rather than its beauty, and the tomb-memorials of

bishops, who here repose, will interest the meditative stranger. Among the monuments there is a handsome one recently erected to the memory of the late Rev. W. Smith, v. c. master of the diocesan school, by his pupils: the celebrated Oliver Goldsmith, who was born at a place called Ballyouther, about a mile hence, was educated in this school. There is also a grammar school, founded by Bishop Hodson in 1685. Both these establishments are ably conducted by the Rev. Thos. Flynn, A.M. In addition to the above seminaries, there are schools for children of both sexes, connected with the Church Education Society and the National Board of Education. The Roman Catholic chapel is a neat and commodious building.

The resident and local magistrates superintend the municipal affairs of the town, and hold sessions once a week in the sessions-house—a small building, appropriated to that and other public purposes. A dispensary and a constabulary barrack are the only other public establishments. The neighbourhood of Elphin is ornamented by several cheerful residences and some handsome mansions. Among these are the Deanery House, the residence of the Very Rev. John French; Cloonyquin, John French, Esq.; Church View, the Rev. J. Morton, and Lissadurn, John Balfie, Esq. A good market, for corn and butter, is held on Wednesday. Fairs, May 3rd, June 27th, Sept. 26th, and December 10th. Elphin parish contained, in 1841, 6,781 inhabitants, and the town (or city) 1,551 of that number.

**EYRECOURT,**

A SMALL market town in the parish of Donanaghta, barony of Longford, county of Galway, about 90 miles w. by s. from Dublin, 44 e. by s. from Galway, 14 n.w. from Parsonstown, and 11 s. e. from Ballinasloe; situated in the midst of a fine corn district, on the road by Banagher to Loughrea. The town derives its name from the Eyre family, lords of the manor; and contiguous to the town is Eyrecourt Castle, a magnificent structure, the property of the family, at present occupied by John Eyre, Esq. J. P. a great patron of the town, and evincing a lively anxiety for its prosperity. The interior of the castle is eminently deserving the stranger's notice; the staircase, in particular, is supposed to be the finest in Ireland. Over the hall door is inscribed

the following sentence.—'Welcome to the House of Liberty.' In the demesne, which is beautifully laid out, is a large fort, from which a cave is said to run two miles and a half, and to open near the beautiful and ancient abbey of Meelick. The trade of the place is quite of a local character, and with the exception of the Eyrecourt corn mills, of Mr. Horsman, there is no prominent branch. The government of the town is vested in the magistrates and a seneschal; the former meet in petty session once a fortnight; the latter holds a court every three weeks—both in the court-house.

The parish church of Donanaghta is a plain but neat stone edifice, erected in 1818, with a tower and one bell. The Roman Catholic chapel is large and hand-
