KILLALA,

A SMALL sea-port, the seat of a diocese and parish, in the barony of Tyravley, county of Mayo, is 165 miles nearly n.w. from Dublin, 38 n. of Newport, 28 n. from Castlebar, and 7 1/2 n. from Ballina; pleasantly seated on the bay of its name, and on the south bank of the Moy. The harbour affords good and safe anchorage for vessels drawing eight or nine feet of water, but those drawing twelve feet must wait high water to obtain an anchorage. The manufacture of coarse linen at one time was of some consequence, now the principal trade is the export of grain and provisions. The imports, which, since the improvements in the port of Ballina have diminished, consist of planks, iron, slates, herrings, and sugar. The fishery employs about three hundred persons, and a considerable quantity of sea manure is landed at the quay.

The episcopal See of Killala was founded by Saint Patrick between the years 434 and 441. In 1591, Elizabeth permitted the deanery of Anchory to be held with the bishopric of Killala, and, in 1623, Archibald Adair was consecrated Bishop of Killala and Anchory. In 1833 these sees became annexed to the archiepiscopal

see of Tuam, and the temporalities were vested in the ecclesiastical commissioners. The cathedral, which is also the parish church, is an ancient structure, with a spire, repaired in 1817 and 1820. Killala Castle, formerly the episcopal palace, is a modern building, standing in a commanding situation overlooking the bay. There are places of worship for Roman Catholics and Wesleyan Methodists. A free school, under Erasmus Smith's foundation, one upon the national plan, and a valuable dispensary, are the public institutions. It was at Kilcummin Bay, about four miles distant, that the French landed, in 1798, under General Humbert, as before-mentioned. One of the ancient round towers, so peculiar to this country, eighty-four feet high, stands in the town; a mile eastward are the fine ruins of Moyne Abbey, founded for Dominican friars, by the family of the O'Dowdes, in 1412; and not far distant from this are the ruins of Roserke Abbey, all meriting the traveller's notice. A good market is held on Saturday, and fairs May 28th, August 17th, and November 8th. The parish of Killala contained, in 1841, 3,253 inhabitants, and the town 1,446 of that number.

HEADFORD,

A MARKET and post town, partly in the parish of Kilkilvery, but chiefly in that of Killursa, barony of Clare, county of Galway, 136 miles w. from Dublin, 30 south from Castlebar, and 20 n. from Galway; situated on the main road between the two last named towns. This neat and clean little place is the property of R. J. M. St. George, Esq. who has accomplished much in the improvement of his town, the comfort of his tenantry, and the promotion of morality and education—the latter desirable object he has effected by the establishment of free schools under the superintendence of both Protestant and Catholic ministers. Headford Castle, the seat of this gentleman, is a handsome building in the Elizabethan style of architecture, erected on the ruins of the ancient castle; the extensive demesne,

which is laid out with great taste, is entered from the town by a good gateway. Other families of distinction have residences in the neighbourhood, which abounds with fine scenery, particularly that on the banks of Loch Carrig. Between this lake and the town are the ruins of Ross Abbey, partially covered with ivy. It was founded by Lord Granard in 1498 for Observantine Franciscans. The only place of worship is the parish church, a small neat edifice, and the principal public charity is a valuable dispensary. From this useful institution, more than four thousand sick poor have annually received medicinal treatment gratuitously. The market is held on Tuesday, and fairs 11th of May and 14th of October. The population of the town, when taken in 1841, was 1,647.

LOUGHREA,

A MARKET town, in the parish and barony of its name, county of Galway, is 109 miles w. by s. from Dublin, 23 east from Galway, and 26 miles south by east from Tuam; pleasantly situated on the banks of Loughrea Lake, the water of which is said to be supplied by seven distinct springs, called the 'Seven Sisters.' Its length north-westward is one mile and a half, its extreme breadth one mile, and its area comprises about seven hundred and sixty acres. It is said to contain no fish but pike, and its waters to be unfit for culinary purposes. Loughrea was formerly garrisoned,

and the remains of its walls are yet visible; there are also the remains of an old castle, and a monastery—the former erected by the Earl of Ulster at an early period, the latter founded for Carmelite or white friars by Richard de Burgh, in the year 1300; adjoining it a very neat chapel has been erected, through the exertions of the Rev. Miles Gannon. There is also a convent for nuns of the Carmelite order, founded about the year 1680, and removed to its present site in 1829, when the building, including a chapel, was erected, under the direction of the prior of the abbey, at a cost
