

tage at Glengarriff, about twelve miles from the town, seated in the most charming and romantic spot that can well be imagined. At one of those pleasing retreats this distinguished nobleman devotes the greater part of his leisure and fortune to the improvement and cultivation of his large estates. The staple of Bantry is corn, in the exportation of which a large capital is employed, the quantity averaging five thousand barrels of wheat, and twenty thousand of oats annually. The mills of Mr. P. Kingston and Mr. M. Murphy, and the corn stores of Mr. J. O'Connell, are very extensive. The parish church is an elegant Gothic structure, having a lofty tower, adorned with pinnacles: it is

situated on the bank of the river, at the western extremity of the town; and the Roman Catholic chapel on an eminence at the eastern. The Wesleyan Methodists have a place of worship. In a large school-house the poor Catholic children are educated; to defray the expenses of erecting the premises, the late Rev. Daniel O'Crowley bequeathed £200., and the noble earl before mentioned gave the land for its site. The Protestants have also a school for instructing their poor. The market is held on Wednesday. Fairs, March 19th, May 1st, June 9th, July 15th, August 21st, October 15th, and December 1st. The population of the town, in 1841, was 4,082.

BORRISOLEIGH

IS a small post village, in the parish of Glankee, barony of Upper Kilnamanagh, county of Tipperary, 98 miles s.w. from Dublin, 46 n.n.w. from Clonmel, 18 s.s.e. from Nenagh, 7½ n.w. from Thurles, and about 6 s.w. from Templemore; situated on the main road between Thurles, Nenagh, and Cashel, in a picturesque district, at the south-eastern base of the fertile declivities of the Devil-Bilt mountains. The constabulary, and also the revenue police, have stations here, and the sub-inspector of the former and a principal officer of the latter reside in the village. The places for divine worship are the parish church and a Roman Catholic chapel; and the principal charitable institutions are a national school and a dispensary—the latter within the Thurles poor-law union. Fairs, June 9th, August 6th, and November 27th, for cattle. The parish of Glankee contained, in 1841, 7,481 inhabitants, and the village 1,438 of that number.

BRUFF AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

BRUFF is a pleasant post village, in the parish of its name, barony of Coshma, county of Limerick, situated on the mail road from Cork, 15 miles s. from the former city, and 47 s. from the latter; seated on the banks of the river Dawn, in a delightful and fertile part of the country. Cahir Guillamore, the elegant seat of Lord Guillamore, is near the town, and in the neighbourhood are the seats, villas, and mansions of many of the gentry; while the ruins of several castles add to the picturesque character of the scenery. The town, which consists of one long street, with several lanes branching from it, was formerly the property of the Hartstonge family, and now forms part of the Limerick estates. The constabulary force have a barrack here, and one for the military is about to be erected. In a neat court-house general sessions are held in January and June, and petty sessions every alternate

Wednesday. John N. Barron, Esq. of Charleville, is the stipendiary magistrate. The trade of Bruff is mainly of a local and retail character; a corn mill and a good hotel are, perhaps, the most prominent branches.

The places of worship are the parish church, an ancient structure, and a Roman Catholic chapel, a spacious and rather handsome stone building. A commodious school, called the 'Adelaide School,' was erected in 1843, the site of ground having been given by Lord Carbery, who also built the walls and offices, and it was completed by subscriptions raised through the exertions of the Rev. Godfrey Massy, the vicar. A school, under the National Board, and a dispensary, are the other principal public institutions. Fairs, May 24th, October 23rd, and November 18th and 28th. The parish contained, in 1841, 2,900 inhabitants, and the village 1,398 of that number.
