**COACHES AND CARS.**

All call at the Carberry Arms Hotel.  
To CORK, the Royal Mail (from Limerick), every morning a quarter before eleven; goes through Kilmallock, Charleville, Buttevant and Mallov—and Bianconi's Car, every morning (Sunday excepted), at ten; goes through Kilmallock, Kildorrery, Fermoy and Watergrass Hill.  
To LIMERICK, the Royal Mail (from Cork), every afternoon at half-past one—and a Car, every morning (Sunday excepted), at half-past seven.

Chapel, rebuilt in 1839, is a large and handsome building, with a beautiful lantern tower, designed by J. B. Cave, Esq. architect, of Dublin, and was commenced and finished by the Rev. Michael Tobin. The Society of Friends have a place of worship. The Caher local relief committee, formed in 1809, established a dispensary, which was found so beneficial, that a fever hospital was afterwards opened under the same auspices. A parochial school, for an unlimited number of children of all religions, is endowed by the late Earl Glengall and Erasmus Smyth; the school premises, built in 1818, are substantial, convenient and handsome. There is also a school, supported by the commissioner of national education. The beautiful seats in the neighbourhood which here and there open to the view, contribute to diversify the variegated scenery of majestic mountains whose dusky summits exhibit a striking contrast to the verdant carpet expanding at their base. On an island in the river stands Caher Castle, erected by O'Connor, king of Thomond and monarch of Ireland, before the year 1142. This castle was subdued

by George Carey, in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and afterwards by Cromwell. It is highly gratifying to be enabled to state that this interesting stronghold of former days is kept up in a perfect state of repair and defence by the nobleman before-named—its proprietor; on the ramparts are planted several pieces of cannon; and the interior is amply stored with warlike munition. It is the depot of the staff of the Tipperary militia, and it is also occupied by a company of infantry. Caher confers the inferior titles of viscount and baron on the noble family of Butler, descended from the ancient house of Ormond. It was to this town that the enterprising Mr. Charles Bianconi despatched his first car from Clonmel. The sale of linen and yarn, at the market held on Friday, has entirely ceased; but a vast number of pigs, sheep, &c. are sold. At the fairs, considerable business is done—they are held on the 26th of May, the 20th of July, the 18th of September, and the 7th of December. The parish of Caher contained, by the census taken in 1841, 8,801 inhabitants; and the town 5,668 of that number.

**CAHER**

IS a respectable market town and parish, in the barony of Iffa and Offa West, county of Tipperary, 110 miles s.w. from Dublin, 52 n. by E. of Cork, 40 w.s.w. of Waterford, 10 west of Clonmel, the like distance south of Cashel, and 15 s.e. of Tipperary, seated on the river Suir. It is a rising and beautifully situated town; the houses are tastefully and substantially built, the streets kept in the neatest order, and none of that squalid misery seen unhappily in some other places is here to be met with. The Earl of Glengall, the benevolent patron and proprietor of the town and his amiable countess, are ever active in improving the moral and physical condition of the poor, and contributing largely to their comforts. Caher House, the seat of the Earl, contiguous to the town, is a stately mansion, and the demesne extends for more than two miles on both sides the river. The park is finely planted and well stocked with deer: and in a secluded part of it is a picturesque retreat of modern erection, called the 'Cottage,' greatly admired for the surpassing beauty of its situation. The

manufacture of linens, and also of straw plat, which prevailed here to some extent, have declined, and the staple trade is now corn and flour—for the manufacture of the latter there are in the town and immediate neighbourhood some of the largest mills in the country. The trade of this place and neighbourhood will be much improved when the railway from Tipperary to Carrick-on-Suir is completed; and which it is intended shall communicate with the Upper Shannon by a branch from Tipperary to Kilmaloe. The government of the town is vested in the local magistrates who meet in petty sessions every alternate Thursday; and a manorial court, in which debts are recoverable under £10, is held by the seneschal every six weeks.

The church, which was rebuilt in 1817, is a spacious stone structure, in the later English style, with an embattled tower, surmounted by a finely proportioned spire. The interior of the church, which is finished in a handsome, chaste style, may vie in appearance with any church in the kingdom. The Roman Catholic
