

# CASTLE-ISLAND,

A MARKET town and parish, in the barony of Trillick, county of Kerry, is 171 miles s.w. from Dublin, 50 s.w. from Limerick, and 10 s. by s. from Tralee; situated on the river Maime, at the junction of the roads from Tralee and Killarney to Limerick, and on the route from Tralee to Cork. This place, which derives its name from the 'Castle of the Island of Kerry,' erected by Geoffrey de Marisco in 1226, consists of one long, and wide street, extending nearly east and west, with a market-house at the western extremity. It possesses little or no trade, in consequence of its contiguity to its more thriving neighbour Tralee. The river Maime rises suddenly from a well called Tubbernaung, about three quarters of a mile to the south-east of the town, flows by the south side of it, and is crossed by three bridges at very short distances from each other.

The parish church is in the Gothic style, having a nave of a former structure, with the belfry thickly covered with ivy. The church, having recently undergone considerable repairs, almost rebuilt, presents an interesting and pleasing appearance. The Roman Catholic chapel, a spacious cruciform structure, has recently been repaired and new-fronted with stone. Schools for children of both sexes are supported by the proprietors of the seignior and the rector; and there are two others under the superintendence of the National Board. In these several schools upwards of four hundred children receive gratuitous education. A dispensary has been established at the court-house, above the market-hall, a substantial stone building, and petty sessions are held every alternate Thursday. Between the western and the central bridges, on the banks of the Maime, are the ruins of the castle, consisting of several detached masses, two of which are of lofty elevation, and the whole denote the original structure to have been of considerable extent. The market, now in disuse, is entitled to be held on Friday. Fairs, January 1st, February 2nd, March 17th, Easter Monday, April 20th, May 20th, June 24th, August 1st, September 8th, October 1st, and November 1st and 30th. Population of the parish, in 1841, 7,967, including 1,687 returned for the town.

# CHARLEVILLE,

A MARKET town (formerly a parliamentary borough), in the parish of Rathgogan, barony of Orrery and Kenmore, county of Cork, is 140 miles s. w. from Dublin, 36 n. from Cork, 57 n. e. from Killarney, 25 s. from Limerick, and 15 n. from Mallow; pleasantly situated on the confines of Cork and Limerick counties, on the high road between the two cities so named, in a rich and fertile part of the country, well supplied with water. The town owes its establishment to Roger, first Earl of Orrery, and Lord President of Munster, who, in compliment to Charles II, changed its name from Rathgogan (its parochial appellation), to Charleville. This nobleman held his court here, and bestowed on its improvement a portion of that munificence for which the noble family of Boyle has been eminently distinguished. Among other praiseworthy acts was the liberal endowment of a free school. The Earl of Charleville takes his title from this place. The town consists of several streets, is neat and respectable in its appearance, and maintains a considerable retail trade. A small stream, called the Glynn river, encircles the town, and propels two corn mills. The county magistrates, residing near the town, hold petty sessions; and

a court of record, for claims to the amount of £200, is held by the senechal of the manor: the proceedings are according to the usual course of law.

The parish church is a plain building, without tower or spire. The Roman Catholic chapel is neat and spacious, erected in 1812 by subscription; the altar is embellished with several fine paintings. In 1829 a cupola was constructed upon the chapel, and a house built for the parish priest. A commodious building has been erected for the holding of public religious meetings, and for occasional preaching. There are several public schools, including one under the national board, the latter, occupying a very handsome building. A classical school was founded by the first Earl of Orrery before-mentioned, and endowed with £40. per annum; and a large number of female children are instructed in the Convent of the Sisters of Mercy. A fever hospital and a dispensary are the other principal charitable institutions. The market, a well supplied one, is held on Saturday. Fairs, January 10th, March 16th, May 12th, August 15th, October 10th, and November 12th. The parish of Rathgogan contained, in 1841, 5,178 inhabitants; and Charleville town 4,287 of that number.
