

and the first Tuesday and Wednesday after the 15th August. The population of the several parishes of Holy Trinity, Saint Ann's Shandon, Saint Finbarr, Saint Mary's Shandon, Saint Nicholas, Saint Paul, and Saint Peter, collectively, in 1843, was 92,984, and the city portion of the same parishes 80,720 of that number.

BLACKROCK is a village and chapelry, in the parish of Saint Finbarr, county of the city of Cork, about two miles E. S. E. from Cork; beautifully situated upon the southern margin of the Lee. It is one of the most considerable of the suburban parts of Cork, and abounds in all the fairer forms that cultivation glories in. We cannot, in this work, dwell upon, or do justice to, its many natural beauties, or the elegant display of architectural taste that embellishes the villas and mansions of the gentry and the opulent. The castle, which rises from the river, is one of the most pleasing objects in the vicinity. It was re-built upon its ancient foundation in 1839, by the harbour commissioners, and is a monument of their taste and liberality. The tower, which is upwards of one hundred feet high from its base, contains two lights, one each for the harbour and river. Here is the largest convent in the kingdom; it is a magnificent central stone building, and most delightfully situated. The education of the female members of the higher branches of society is conducted upon a large scale, embracing every accomplishment. There is besides a school for the children of the poor, who are educated, gratuitously, to the number of five hundred. The places of worship are a chapel under the establishment, a very neat modern building with a spire, and a Catholic chapel, which is spacious and handsome. The steam vessels, from Cork and Cove, call at Blackrock, and a commodious quay has been constructed for their accommodation. Population of the village about 300.

DOUGLAS is a small village and chapelry, in the parish of Carrigaline, barony of Cork, from two to two miles and a half south-east of the city; situated on the Douglas rivulet, on the road from Cork to Passage, and is so beautifully connected with the outskirts of the city, by an uninterrupted chain of sumptuous villas, as to be almost strictly suburban. There is a very extensive rope manufactory, belonging to Mr. Besnard, the machinery of which is propelled by water, and is supposed to be the largest of the kind in Ireland; there is also a corn mill and a mill for the pounding of flax. In a delightful and healthy situation, upon an eminence, and commanding a magnificent view of the many neighbouring scenes, is the establishment of Mrs. Sexton Baylee, for the education of young ladies. There are places of worship for Protestants and Catholics—that for the former is a neat modern stone building, and is a chapel of ease to the parish of Carrigaline. There are also two schools, one each for Protestant and Catholic children, and a dispensary for the sick poor. Population of the village 845.

GLANMIRE is a village, in the parish of Rathcooney, north liberties of the county and city of Cork, four miles from the city, on the road to Dublin; situated on both sides the Glanmire river, which, after winding

through a beautiful glen, empties itself under a fine draw-bridge of cast-iron into the river Lee. This beautiful and extensive suburb is ornamented with plantations and hanging woods, and studded with villas and residences in lovely situations. Lower Glanmire, Little Island, Lota, Corbally, and Butierstown, may all be taken as forming an integral part of Glanmire village. The river is navigable up to the village, at high water, for lighters, which bring up coal, culm, sea sand, for manure, and various articles for the supply of the neighbourhood. There are extensive flour mills and bleach-works in this locality. The church or chapel of Rathcooney, a neat building, a national school, and a dispensary, are the public establishments. Population of Glanmire village about 500.

About one mile from Glanmire is the beautiful and small village of RIVERSTOWN, partly in Cahirllog parish and partly in that of Templemore, barony of Barrymore; situated in a richly-planted valley, close to the confluence of two small rivers. It was formerly called Saddierstown, and is said to have obtained its present and modern appellation from its situation. An extensive distillery, the property of Messrs. Lyon and Co. of Cork, and a large flour mill, are established here. The village numbers less than one hundred inhabitants.

BLARNEY is a village, in the parish of Garrycloyne, barony of East Muskerry, county of Cork, between five and six miles N. W. by W. from Cork; situated on a river of the same name, over which is a handsome bridge of three arches, on the road from Cork to Kanturk. It is seated amongst delightful woodland scenery, and is celebrated for its ancient 'Castle of Blarney.' This noted fortress, now a fine and highly interesting ruin, was built in 1446, by Cormac McCarthy, equally distinguished for his extraordinary strength and feats of chivalry, as by elegance and grace both of person and mind. The interest which both natives and strangers take in the castle, arises from a tradition connected with a stone in its north-eastern angle, about twenty feet from the top, which bears an inscription in Latin, recording the erection of the castle. This is called the 'Blarney stone,' and has given rise to the well known phrase of 'Blarney,' in reference to a notion that the person kissing or licking it will possess the power of being irresistibly persuasive or cajoling, but, at the same time, his tongue will be false and flattering. Few, however, venture upon this ceremony, from the danger of being lowered down, by a rope, from an insecure battlement full one hundred and thirty feet high. The 'Groves of Blarney' are of considerable extent, and very interesting; and beneath the castle are some extensive natural caves well worth exploring. A large mill, belonging to Mr. M. Mahony, for the manufacture of worsted and woollen goods, furnishes employment to a number of the inhabitants of the village. The place of worship, under the establishment, is a neat structure, in the Italian style of architecture; that for the service of the Roman Catholics is situated about a mile from the village. A parochial school and a dispensary afford their respective benefits to children and the indigent sick. Fairs September 18th and November 11th. Population of the village, two hundred and fifty.
