KILLARNEY, &c.

Munster.

Patrick Lord Kerry, were entombed here in 1600. The choir contains several monuments with inscriptions, and on a large white stone are the armorial bearings of the McCarthy Mores. The cloister is in a very perfect state; in the centre stands an immense yew, whose bole rises perpendicularly upwards of thirty feet, when its spreading branches overshadow the whole cloister, and form a gloomy canopy. The Upper Lake is three miles to the east of Tore Lake, in the passage between which various romantic objects present themselves, during the somewhat difficult and circuitous navigation from one lake to the other.

Killarney, like other places of resort dependent on fashion or the tourist, is comparatively deserted in the winter, but, as summer returns, so does all its gaiety and business. It is a remarkably clean town, and kept in the nicest order, presenting an aspect of prosperity and respectability. There are several hotels of the first grade in their arrangements for the comfort of families, or tourists, or commercial gentlemen—they are the 'Hibernia,' and the 'Kenmare Arms,' in Main-street, and the 'Royal Victoria,' at Low Lake. An important branch of business has originated here, in the manufacture of fancy articles, similar to the Tunbridge ware goods: they are formed from the wood of the beautiful arbutus tree, which flourishes, as before stated, on the islands of, and mountains surrounding, the lakes, and is not to be met with elsewhere in such perfection and maturity as in this romantic region. It is capable of receiving the finest polish, and, together with the hoofs of the wild deer, is made into snuff boxes, rings, and a variety of fancy articles, for which there is a great demand in the season. A visit to the manufactory of Mr. Egan, in the Main-street, cannot fail of affording gratification to the stranger. The only other prominent branch that may be particularized is comprised in some corn mills—'Deanagh Mills,' belonging to Mr. C. Gallwey, and 'Oaklawn Mills,' Mr. J. Sheehy, being extensive and powerful works. General sessions of the peace are held in January, April, July, and October;

KILLARNEY AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

KILLARNEY is a market town, populous and respectable, in the parish of its name, barony of Magothy, county of Kerry, 180 miles s. w. from Dublin, 47 n. from Cork, 39 s. from Dingle, 35 s. from Listowel, and 20 s. e. from Tralee. This interesting, handsome, and flourishing town is situated on the main road from Cork to Tralee, and in the midst of unrivalled scenery and romantic lakes. During the summer months this district is the resort of visitors, in great numbers, from all quarters, attracted by the far-famed lakes, and their attendant beauties, and venerable ecclesiastical structures, and ruined castles. We have, at page 148 of this work, in the general sketch of Kerry, briefly described the lakes for which that county is so peculiarly celebrated, it only remains for us, therefore, to add a few particulars connecting these beautiful waters with the town under notice. The most interesting of all the Kerry lakes are about a mile and a half from the town of Killarney, and consist, as mentioned in a previous place, of the Lower, the Middle, and the Upper Lakes, spread out on the slopes of a chain of lofty mountains. Of the numerous islands in the Lower Lake (which is six miles in length by three in breadth), the largest is that called Ross Island, which, being separated from the mainland only by an artificial channel crossed by a bridge, forms a peninsula projecting considerably into the lake.

Here are the picturesque ruins of Ross Castle, founded by the O'Donoghues. The shores are richly ornamented with thriving plantations, and the arbutus and other evergreens flourish, in this favoured spot, with luxuriance and beauty. Near the castle is a small pier, this being the general point of embarkation for visitors to the lakes. To the west of Ross Island is that of Innisfallen, the most lovely and interesting of all in the Lower Lake: it forms the subject of Moore's beautiful melody commencing 'Sweet Innisfallen, fare thee well.' The ruins of Innisfallen Abbey, and other attractive beauties, the visitor will be conducted to by willing guides. The Middle, or Tore Lake, is separated from the Lower Lake by the islands of Denis and Briceken and the peninsula of Muckross; the lake is two miles in length and one in breadth. Here are the 'Devil's Island' and bay, the former a huge rock; Tore Cottage, an elegant seat; the mountain of Mangerton, and the 'Devil's Punchbowl,' on its summit; the 'Glen of the Horse' on its eastern side, and the picturesque ruins of Muckross Abbey, on a gentle acclivity, at the eastern end of the peninsula. The abbey, which rears its venerable head amidst lofty trees of ash and lime, was founded by Donald McCarthy, in 1440, for conventual Franciscans, and has since been the cemetery of the McCarthy's. Donald, Earl of Clancare, and his nephew,
