**KILMACTHOMAS**

IS an inconsiderable town or rather village, partly in  
 the parish of Ballynaneen, but chiefly in that of Ross-  
 mire, barony of Upperthird, county of Waterford, 110  
 miles s. w. from Dublin, and 15 w. s. w. from Water-  
 ford; situated half a mile from the high road between  
 the latter city and that of Cork, on a steep hill, at the  
 foot of which flows the small river Mahon. The Power  
 family, anciently 'Le Poer,' erected a fine castle here,

which, along with others in the eastern division of the  
 county, were reduced and demolished by Sir Charles  
 Vavasour in 1643. The country around here is pictu-  
 resque, but there are few, if any objects of peculiar in-  
 terest or attraction. The places of worship are a church  
 of the establishment, and a Roman Catholic chapel.  
 Fairs May 12th, August 12th, and December 6th.  
 Population of the village, in 1841, 1,197.

**KILMALLOCK,**

AN ancient corporate, post, and market town and  
 parish, forming a liberty, in the county of Limerick,  
 138 miles s. w. from Dublin, 43 s. from Cork, and 20  
 s. from Limerick, situated at the junction of the roads  
 leading to Tipperary, Limerick, and Charleville, and on  
 the western bank of a small stream called the Lubbach.  
 Though now in a ruinous condition, this place promi-  
 nently figured in the annals of Irish warfare, and the  
 remains of its walls, together with those of many strong  
 castles, ruined monasteries, decayed churches, and  
 spacious private dwellings, still remain to testify its  
 former magnificence. It has been called, in allusion to  
 its present appearance, the 'Irish Balbec.' In 1598 it  
 was invested by the Irish, but the Earl of Ormonde  
 compelled them to relinquish the siege. In the tumultu-  
 ous times of 1641, the possession of this town was  
 sharply contested by the insurgents. Kilmallock for-  
 merly enjoyed distinctive municipal privileges, and with  
 its extensive liberties constituted a separate county. Its  
 consequence and trade are now annihilated; the shops

are few and small, and a respectable inn, kept by  
 Mr. Gilbertson, is the principal business establishment.  
 The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul was  
 formerly collegiate, and is an ancient and spacious  
 structure, in variously mixed styles of architecture, in a  
 sad dilapidated state; of the tomb-memorials some are  
 interesting, and, in ages past, doubtless, were elegant;  
 one to the family of Coote is still handsome. The  
 Roman Catholic chapel is a good sized building, erected  
 in 1814, and subsequently enlarged. A dispensary, sup-  
 ported by subscription, is the principal charity. In  
 the immediate neighbourhood of Kilmallock is Mount  
 Coote, the delightful property of Captain Chas. Coote;  
 there are also several other seats in the vicinity. A  
 charter for a market still exists, but is not made avail-  
 able. Fairs, February 21st, March 25th, Tuesday in  
 Whitsun week, July 6th, November 8th, and December  
 4th. The population of the liberty of Kilmallock, in  
 1841, was 3,126, including 1,408 inhabitants for the  
 town.

**KILRUSH,**

A SEA-PORT, market town, and parish, in the  
 barony of Moyarta, county of Clare, 176 miles s. w.  
 from Dublin, 117 n. w. from Cork, 53 w. from Limerick,  
 26 s. w. from Ennis, 18 s. from Miltown, and 10 e. s. e.  
 from Kiskee; situated on the northern shore of the  
 estuary of the Shannon, about fifteen miles from its  
 mouth, having an excellent harbour, and possessing  
 other local advantages. The town, which is neatly  
 built and annually improving, consists of a market  
 square intersected from east to west by a spacious  
 street, well flagged, with smaller thoroughfares branch-  
 ing off. The pier, which is of very solid construction,

is protected by a sea wall of great strength, and is very  
 commodious, affording every facility for landing passen-  
 gers from the steam vessels, which ply regularly be-  
 tween this place and Limerick, as well as for agricul-  
 tural and commercial uses. Kilrush, besides its own  
 domestic business and extensive fishery, enjoys benefits  
 resulting from genteel families resorting hither in the  
 bathing season. At the bottom of Frances-street are  
 the two principal hotels—well arranged establishments  
 for the accommodation of families or the commercial  
 gentleman: one of these, Williams', is also a posting  
 house. Thirty years ago the whole corn trade of this
