LISTOWEL,

A SMALL market town and parish, in the barony of
Isaghticconor, county of Kerry, is 170 miles s.w. by w.
from Dublin, 40 n. from Killarney, and 22 n.e. from
Tralee; cheerfully and pleasantly situated on ground
gently declining to the banks of the river Feale, over
which is a handsome bridge of five arches. According
to some authorities this place obtained its name from
Lis-Tuathal, or the castle of Tuathal, one of the ear-
liest kings of Ireland. The town, which is clean and
well built, lays some claim to antiquity, in the posses-
sion of a castle, the last fortress held by the Lord of
Kerry against Queen Elizabeth. In the wall of the
castle is a projecting stone on which is a sculptured
face, thought to be that of the architect M'Elligott. The
castle formerly belonged to the family of Fitzmaurice,
of Duagh, to whose ancestors it was granted by Henry
II, and the manorial rights were purchased from the
late Earl of Kerry, by the father of the present Earl of
Listowel, who takes his title from this place. Petty
sessions are held every Saturday in the court-house, a
stone building, convenient and neat. The trade of this
town is principally of a local and domestic character,

receiving valuable benefit from its fairs, which are in-
variably well attended.

The parish church is rather a handsome structure, in
the later English style, with a tower, surmounted by a
neat spire. It was erected in 1819, by means of a grant
of £500. and a loan of £1,000, from the late Board of
First Fruits. The ruins of the old church and the
burial-ground adjoin the Tarbert road, in the vicinity of
the town. The Roman Catholic chapel is a spacious
cruciform edifice, with a well-designed portico, and the
altar-piece is richly embellished. At GLOUNAFOOKA
is a convent of the Presentation Order, the ladies of
which meritoriously devote a large portion of their time
to the gratuitous instruction of six hundred female
children in the useful branches of education. A school,
under the national board, for boys and a fever hospital,
are the other charities. The markets are held on Tues-
day and Friday; and chartered fairs May 13th, July
25th, and October 28th. There is also a fair held every
alternate Tuesday and the following day, chiefly for pigs.
Population of the parish, in 1841, 5,934, inclusive of
2,598 inhabitants of the town.

MACROOM,

OR MACROOM, is a small market town and parish,
in the barony of West Muskerry, county of Cork, 182
miles s.w. from Dublin, 56 s.e. from Tralee, 33 s. by e.
from Killarney, and 30 w. by n. from Cork; situated on
the Sullane (which stream discharges itself into the river
Lee), in a healthy open vale, surrounded by hills, and
enlivened and fertilized by the winding course of the
river. The principal trade is in corn, and in the pur-
chase of pigs for the Cork market, in which a great
amount of business is transacted. A manorial court for
the recovery of debts not exceeding 40s. is held every
third week before the seneschal, John B. Warren, Esq.,
the jurisdiction of which is very extensive, compre-
hending several parishes in addition to that of Mac-
room. Petty sessions are held every alternate Wednes-
day, and quarter sessions for the West Riding of the
county in December. The court-house is a neat stone
building, ornamented with a cornice and pediment, sup-

ported by two pilasters, between which is a handsome
Venetian window; connected with it is the bridewell.

The parish church is a small modern edifice in the
later English style. The Roman Catholic chapel is a
large and rather handsome building, with a lofty tower:
its interior decorations are of a superior order, and the
congregation very large. A national school and a dis-
pensary are the chief benevolent institutions. Macroom
Castle, the seat of the Hon. William White Hedges, is
the principal mansion in the neighbourhood. This
castle was the birth-place of Admiral Sir Wm. Penn,
father of the distinguished founder of Pennsylvania, in
the United States of America. A well-attended market
is held on Saturday. Fairs May 12th, June 14th, July
12th, August 12th, September 12th, October 12th,
November 12th, and December 14th. Macroom parish
contained, in 1841, 7,227 inhabitants, and the town
4,794 of that number.
