house is very tasteful; its portico cost £1,000, and the two structures £25,000., defrayed by the North Riding of the county. The union workhouse will accommodate one thousand paupers. A small infantry barrack, on Summerhill, can receive four hundred men. Petty sessions are held every Monday, and the general assizes twice a year. Nenagh is not aided by the presence of manufactures, but it enjoys a good domestic trade, sustained by a larger portion of resident gentry than perhaps any other inland town of its size in Ireland, and by its own respectable inhabitants. Messrs. Burr and Co. have a very considerable brewery here, and the Tipperary Joint-Stock Bank and the National Bank of Ireland have branches in this place; there are also a savings' bank and a loan fund—the deposits in the former, since 1827, the date of its establishment, amount to £50,000.; Mr. Lynden is the actuary. fund is a great benefit to the industrious poor. There are two newspapers published in Nenagh, the 'Nenagh Guardian' (conservative), established in 1838, and the 'Tipperary Vindicator' (liberal), established in 1844; they are both ably conducted.

The parish church is a plain edifice, erected in 1909 and repaired subsequently; and the Roman Catholic chapel is a neat building. There are places of worship for Wesleyan Methodists and the Christian Brethren. A fever hospital and a dispensary are liberally supported and skilfully conducted. There are schools for the gratuitous instruction of either sex, both Protestant and Catholic. The market is held on Thursday, Fairs, April 24th, May 29th, July 4th, September 4th, October 10th, and November 1st. The parish of Nenagh contained, in 1841, 9,540 inhabitants, and the town 8,618 of that number.

NENAGH

IS a market and assize town and parish, partly in the barony of Upper Ormond, but chiefly in that of Lower Ormond, county of Tipperary, 35 miles S.W. from Dublin, 24 S.E. from Limerick, 20 W.S.W. from Roscrea, 19 S. by E. from Portumna, 11 E.S.E. from Kilkilree, and about 45 S.E. from Youghal bay, in Lough Derg. In describing this locality, we shall make free with an article from the *Dublin Penny Journal*; it says:—"There is not a more beautiful or valuable district than the baronies of Ormond, in the centre of which Nenagh stands; surrounded on all sides by mountains of great and varied forms—some of which are highly metalliferous—bounded on the west by a broad and truly picturesque part of the Shannon, a most productive territory, equally good for tillage or pasture, and abounding in woods, waters, and game. Never did foot of hound or hoof of horse sweep over a finer sporting country than what its dry and healthy plains afford. Well might the Milesian O'Kennedys, and the O'Nearys, and the M'Eagans sigh when they surrendered to the Norman Butlers, and Graces, and Norises; these fine fields, and well might they in their turn, according to the fate of war, retire in sorrow before the Cromwellian possessors." The town is situated on the main road between Dublin and Limerick, and near the Nenagh river. It was formerly defended by a strong castle, called Nenagh Round, the ruins of which are still to be distinguished in Castle street. In 1209 an hospital for Augustinian canons was founded, which was constantly to be open to the sick and in-

firm; this establishment was liberally endowed by Theobald Walter, the first of the Butlers in Ireland. In the year 1559, the friary and the town were destroyed by O'Carroll, but the castle was preserved by the garrison. The friary lands, once so rich, were transferred by lease to Robert Cullum for a trifling rent, by Queen Elizabeth.

The town consists of four streets crossing each other, the market-place forming a centre. It is supplied with water from wells; and on the Dublin road is an excellent spring of water, enclosed by masonry, bearing this inscription:—"Erected by voluntary subscription, to commemorate the benevolence of the English nation to the poor of Ireland, at a season of extreme distress, A.D. 1822." The General News-room, in Castle street, is supported by the gentry of the town and neighbourhood, and is liberally supplied with journals and periodicals. A new court-house and gaol have been built, under the direction of a committee named by the grand jury; the architect was J. B. Keane, Esq., and the contractor for both was Mr. John Hanly, an eminent builder and native of the town. The gaol is constructed upon the modern plan; the governor's house forms the centre, and the seven sections of the prison are connected with it by iron bridges. There is a neat chapel, in which the Protestant and Catholic chaplains officiate alternately; also an underground communication between the gaol and the dock, of the court-house, by means of a tunnel, through which the prisoners pass to their trials. The court-
