

nishing employment to a considerable number of artisans; and many others of the labouring classes are occupied in discharging the cargoes of large vessels, as none above 400 or 500 tons burthen can proceed up the river to Cork. A constabulary police station is established here, and petty sessions are held every Friday.

The church, a neat edifice, was considerably enlarged in 1808, and the Roman Catholic chapel, a rather handsome structure, was built in 1832. A parochial school, one in connexion with the Catholic chapel, and a fever hospital and dispensary, comprise the charities. There are neither markets or fairs, but the town is pretty well supplied with all the necessaries of life. Population of the town, in 1841, 1,751.

MONKSTOWN, a village, in the parish of its name, in the same barony as Passage, about one mile from that town, like it, seated on the western bank of the Lee river, and on the new line of road from Carrigaline to the city of Cork. It is said to have obtained its name from a small establishment of Benedictine monks, belonging to the priory of St. John's, Waterford, which settled here in the fourteenth century, and founded Legan Abbey, of which no traces remain. The parish is bounded on the east and south-east by the Lee before-mentioned and Cove harbour, the river affording

every facility for water carriage and excellent anchorage for vessels of almost any burthen. The village, which altogether is remarkably pleasant, comprises a large number of pretty detached villas; some of these are really elegant, especially those situated near the shore, built in the Elizabethan style, of which there are several. The environs are embellished with many beautiful seats placed in delightful situations—amongst these are 'Rock Lodge,' the residence of the Hon. Jas. Tobin; the 'Castle,' B. R. Shaw, Esq.; 'Carrickmahon,' De Courcy O'Grady, Esq. &c. The bath establishment of the Royal Victoria Hotel, conducted by Mr. Gorham, and that also by Mr. Browne, are fitted up with elegance and every appropriate convenience—they comprise warm, cold, vapour, &c. baths. This place is so closely allied to Passage as respects distance, matters of business, and local interests, that it may well be deemed a suburban portion of that town. The church, which stands on a pleasing elevation, is cruciform, with a tower and spire: it contains a fine organ, and the east window exhibits some armorial bearings in stained glass. The public schools are at Passage, and, like that place, Monkstown holds neither markets or fairs. The parish of Monkstown contained, in 1841, 3,487 inhabitants, and the township (or village) 538 of that number.

POST OFFICE, PASSAGE, Robert Clarke, *Post Master*.—Letters from all parts arrive (by mail car from Cork) every morning at nine and afternoon at four, and are despatched thereto every morning at six and afternoon at half-past one.

PORTLAW.

THIS is a thriving little village, partly in the parish of Clonagam, and partly in that of Guileagh, barony of Upperthird, county of Waterford, about 102 miles s.w. from Dublin and 11 w. from Waterford; situated on the small but rapid river Clodagh, and on the confines of Curraghmore Park, the princely seat of the Marquess of Waterford; in addition to this beautiful demesne, the scenery around is exceedingly picturesque. Twenty years ago there was scarcely a cabin to be seen on the spot which is now the site of a flourishing colony, busy and joyous with the hum of remunerated industry. This happy change originated in the establishment of the extensive cotton factory of Messrs. Malcomson Brothers. The process embraces the preparation of the raw material, and finishing the fabric complete for use.

RATHCORMAC AND CASTLE-LYONS.

RATHCORMAC is a market and post town (formerly a parliamentary borough), and a parish, in the barony of Barrymore, county of Cork, about 140 miles from Dublin and between 17 and 18 north-east from Cork; situated on the river Bride, and between the cities above-named. The town consists of one principal street and a few small ones. Several pretty cottages, erected by the Hon. Charles L. Tonson, embellish the Cork entrance to the town, and Lord Riversdale's seat is a great ornament to the vicinity. With the exception of an extensive tannery, a fine nursery, and an excellent commercial inn, the business of the place is of that general character sustained in rural towns. The seneschal of the manor holds a court occasionally, for the recovery of small debts, and the magistrates assemble in petty sessions once a fortnight. The town was erected into a free borough by Charles II, and the inhabitants obtained the privilege of returning two members to the Irish parliament, which they continued to exercise until the Union, when the borough was disfranchised.

The parish church is ancient and rather handsome; it was enlarged in 1828, by means of assistance from the Board of First Fruits. The Roman Catholic chapel, erected in 1816 on a site given by Lord Riversdale, is a large cruciform edifice, with a low square tower. The Wesleyans have a small place of worship; and there is a fever hospital and a dispensary. A national school, a parochial school for females, a loan fund, and a Bible society, are the other institutions established in Rathcormac. The inhabitants possess a charter for a market but they do not avail themselves of it. Fairs August 12th and November 9th; these are held on a beautiful green in the deer park of Lord Riversdale. Population

of Rathcormac parish, in the year 1841, was 5,324, inclusive of 1,321 inhabitants of the town.

CASTLE-LYONS is a neat small market town, in the parish of its name, partly in the barony of Condons and Clongibbons, but chiefly in that of Barrymore, 2½ miles e. by s. from Rathcormac, pleasantly situated in a fertile valley near the river Bride. It was anciently called *Castle Lehan*, from the castle belonging to the sept or clan of Lehan being situated here. On the ruins of this castle, stood the stately mansion of the Barrymore family, which was consumed by fire in 1771. In removing some of the old castle walls a stone chimney-piece was discovered, on which was inscribed, LEHAN O'CYLLARE HEC FECIT MCIII. (Lehan O'Callane erected this in the year 1104), furnishing proof that private structures of stone were erected in Ireland at an earlier period than is generally allowed. Except a corn mill and a small flannel manufactory, there is no particular branch of trade here. A manorial court is held occasionally, by the seneschal, under S. Perrot, Esq. of Cork, to whom the manor belongs, and who has established a free school for the children of the parish.

The church, dedicated to Saint Nicholas, is a chaste building, situated on a gentle acclivity close to the town. In the church-yard, over the family vault, is erected a marble statue of James, Earl of Barrymore, who, in the reign of Queen Anne, was distinguished for his virtues as a patriotic statesman and philanthropist. In 1771 a neat Catholic chapel was erected about half a mile east of the town. The market, chiefly for poultry, is held on Thursday. Fairs January 1st, Easter Monday, Whit-Monday, August 28th, September 29th, and November 16th. Population of the parish, in 1841, 5,536, and of the town 775 of that number.
