## ROSS,

OR ROSSCABBERY, is a small market and post town, the seat of the diocese of Ross, and a parish, the latter partly in the barony of Ibanc and Barryroe, and partly in the western division of the barony of East Carbery, county of Cork, about 200 miles s.e. from Dublin, 9 E. from Skibbereen, and 7 W. from Clonakilty; situated on the main road between the city of Cork and Bantry Bay, on the southern coast, at the head of an extensive creek called Ross Harbour. The dwellings, which occupy the acclivity and summit of a gentle eminence, form four small streets and a square, exhibiting altogether but few vestiges of its ancient ecclesiastical importance, and its present claim to notice is derivable solely from its having been the See of a bishop, which was united to that of Cork in 1586. The See of Ross had its origin in the foundation of the monastery of Saint Faughnan, surnamed Mongach or 'the hairy', the church of which is recorded to have become the cathedral of the diocese in the sixth century and its founder installed as the first bishop. This cathedral, which was rebuilt in 1612, has been from time imme-

morial the parish church. It is a small gothic structure, with a lofty square tower and octagonal spire, the latter raised in 1806. A south transept, which has been (or is about to be) added, renders it perfectly cruciform. There are some monuments to the members of the Hungerford and Townsend families, which, together with the ancient decorations of the interior may impart interest to the visitor. The Roman Catholic chapel, situated at the eastern part of the town, in outward show is unpretending, but its interior is chaste and complete. The charities comprise a dispensary and a national school. Near the town is the handsome seat of Lord Carbery, and about midway to Skibbereen is the elegant mansion of J. S. Townsend, Esq.; these are the principal seats in the neighbourhood. The market, which has fallen into disuse from the proximity of Skibbereen and Clonakilty is chartered for Wed-  
nesday. Fairs August 19th, September 21st, and December 19th. The parish of Rosscarbery contained, in 1841, 8,839 inhabitants, and the town (which is wholly in East Carbery barony) 1,530 of that number.

## SKIBBEREEN,

### WITH THE VILLAGE OF CASTLE-TOWNSEND AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

SKIBBEREEN is a large and populous market town, comprised in the two parishes of Abbeystrowry and Creagh, in the eastern division of the barony of West Carbery, county of Cork, 211 miles s.w. from Dublin, 54 s.w. from Cork, 34 s.w. from Bandon, and 15 s.s.e. from Bantry; situated on the banks of the Ilan, which river flows into Baltimore Harbour and Saint George's Channel. From its situation in a wild unenclosed part of the country, and from having frequently been the scene of commotion and violence, may be ascribed the cause of its not rising so rapidly in the scale of com-  
merce and prosperity as other towns less populous; but of late years Skibbereen has much improved, and may now be considered a flourishing place. It consists of several streets, some of which are wide and well arranged, the houses well built, and the shops stored with all that is required for a town of its size. The retail business is extensive, and a populous neighbour-  
hood is supplied from the stores here. The coal and corn trade is considerable, and brewing and tanning is carried on by two respectable concerns. There are two branch banking establishments, viz. the National Bank of Ireland and the Provincial Bank of Ireland, likewise several assurance agencies. The government of the town is vested in the county and resident magistrates;

they hold petty sessions every Wednesday, and a general sessions of the peace in May. These are held in the court-house, a substantial stone building, situated at the northern end of the town.

The parochial church of Abbeystrowry is a spacious edifice, in the early English style, with a tower at the east end. The Roman Catholic chapel, situated near the court-house, is a handsome edifice, in the Grecian style of architecture. The interior is fitted up with superior taste, and the altar, which is embellished with a painting of the Crucifixion, is a rich specimen of its kind. There are places of worship for Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists—the former in Bridgetown, the latter in North-street: schools are connected with both, affording gratuitous education to the children of the members. A dispensary, supported in the usual way, and schools, under the superintendence of the National Board of Education, are the principal public charities. The market days are Wednesday and Satur-  
day; they are well attended, and abundantly supplied with the usual commodities. Fairs May 14th, July 10th, August 2d, October 12th, and December 11th and 23d. The parishes of Creagh and Abbeystrowry contained collectively, in 1841, 12,640 inhabitants, and the town of Skibbereen 4,715 of that number.
