TRALEE.

WITH THE VILLAGE OF BLENNEVILLE AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

TRALEE is a highly respectable market town and sea-port, a parliamentary borough, and a parish, in the barony of Trughenackmy, county of Kerry, 181 miles s.w. from Dublin, 47 n.w. from Kenmare, 26 e. from Dingle, 20 n. by w. from Killarney, 18 s.w. from Listowel, and 10 n. from Milltown; situated near the foot of a range of mountains, on the Ballymullen or Leigh river, which enters the bay of Tralee about a mile from the town. The ancient name of the place was *Traleigh*, i. e. 'the Strand of the Leigh'—derived from its situation near the point where the river Leigh discharges itself into the broad sandy bay before mentioned. The town is neat, and the streets, of which several are spacious, kept in the nicest order, the whole presenting an air of comfort, respectability, and business, excelled by few, if any, towns in this country. Within these few years many improvements have been made; among the most important and conspicuous is the construction of a ship canal, by which means vessels of any tonnage can now come up to the town. This most valuable work, which reflects so much credit upon its projectors and those entrusted with its completion, was accomplished at an expense of £30,000, and upwards. Several good houses have been built, a new court-house erected, and a new street named Denny-street formed; the latter on the site of the ancient castle Desmond, at the western extremity of which is the entrance to the castle demesne, thrown open to the public, and furnishes a delightful promenade. There is a considerable export in grain, which is annually increasing—wheat and oats are the principal—barley being chiefly purchased for home consumption. The coal and timber trade is also of consequence, and the butter merchants here are of the first stability. The operations of commerce are assisted by three banking establishments—being branches of the 'Bank of Ireland,' the 'National Bank,' and the 'Provincial Bank,' there is also a bank for savings, and several assurance companies have respectable agents here. The inns are well conducted establishments—the 'Blennerhassett Arms Hotel,' in Upper Castle-street, and the 'Royal Oak Hotel,' in Bridge-street, are well recognised for their perfect arrangements—they are both posting houses. The principal public buildings of the town, exclusive of those for divine worship, are the chamber of commerce, the Kerry club-house, the new court-house, a handsome building in Nelson-street; the gaol, a large and substantial structure, convenient for the accommodation and classification of three hundred prisoners; and the infantry barrack, which can accommodate fifteen hundred soldiers, and their complement of officers.

The town was incorporated by a charter of James I. under the style of the 'Provost, Free Burgesses, and Commonalty of the borough of Tralee,' and the privilege

conferred of returning two members to the Irish parliament; the borough was disfranchised at the Union, but the Reform Bill empowered it to return one representative to the Imperial legislature—the gentleman at present enjoying this honour is Maurice O'Connell, of Derrynane Abbey, Esquire. The municipal government is now vested in the commissioners appointed under an act for paving and lighting the town—the chief functionary being the stipendiary magistrate; John Drummond, Esq. is the gentleman now holding that office. The assizes for the county of Kerry are held here; also general sessions of the peace in March, July, October, and December, and petty sessions every Wednesday. Tralee is the head quarters of a constabulary district, and the residence of the county inspector, also of the stipendiary magistrate above named.

The parish church is large and handsome, and has a square pinnacled tower. The Roman Catholic chapel, situated in Upper Castle-street, is a spacious building, fitted up in an elegant manner. Near the church is a Methodist chapel, and on Prince's quay is one for Independents. There are several excellent and charitable institutions. The county infirmary, a neat building, in Strand-street, has a dispensary attached. The fever hospital is a modern structure, forming three sides of a quadrangle, and will accommodate two hundred patients. The national and parochial schools are admirably conducted in this town, and in a convent, of the Presentation order, five hundred female children are educated gratuitously by the exemplary ladies of the establishment. The public and private schools impart instruction to nearly one thousand scholars. There are six almshouses for widows, who are selected by the parish priest. Two miles and a half from Tralee, is a chalybeate spa of considerable celebrity, frequented during the summer season. The market days are Tuesday and Saturday—the latter is the principal and well attended. Fairs, May 3rd, August 4th, November 7th and December 13th. The parish of Tralee contained, in 1841, 13,307 inhabitants, and the town 11,363 of that number.

BLENNEVILLE, a small sea-port village, is one mile west from Tralee, in the parish of Annagh; situated on the bay of Tralee, and, previous to the opening of the ship canal, before referred to, was considered the port of that town. It has still a corn market, and, with this exception, the trade of the place is unimportant. The fishery and dredging for oysters affords employment to a portion of the inhabitants. The parish church is neat and small, with a square tower. Blennerhassett House, the seat of Richard Chute, Esq. is a handsome and pleasant residence—the only one of any note in the parish. A fair is held on the 19th December. Population of the parish, in 1841, about 3,000, and of the village 225.
