**BUNCRANA,**

A SMALL market town, in the parish of Lower  
Fahan, barony of Ennishowen, county of Donegal, is  
152 miles N.W. by N. from Dublin, 12 N. N.W. from  
Londonderry, and 20 W. from Movill; romantically  
and pleasantly situated on the eastern shore of Lough  
Swilly, at the foot of the mountains of Ennishowen.  
The town consists of one long street, near the centre  
of which is the market-house, a commodious structure,  
and adjoining it is an excellent hotel; a little below  
this, on the opposite side, is the sessions house, with a  
bridevel attached. Petty sessions are held every  
alternate Thursday. The spinning of flax and tow is  
carried on here very extensively by Mr. Alexander, who  
employs upwards of two hundred persons in his estab-  
lishment, which is the only branch of consequence in  
the place. From the beauty of its situation, and the  
salubrity of the air, Bunrana has of late years been  
resorted to by respectable families in the summer as a  
bathing place. Lough Swilly here expands into an arm  
of the sea, bounded by mountains and rocks of a ma-  
jestic character, and forming a capacious haven, easy of  
access to vessels of any burden. On the side of the  
entrance are the Swilly rocks, about half a mile from

the shore; and on the western side of Fannet point is  
a lighthouse. Two rivers empty themselves into the  
Lough, one on each side of the town; in the northern  
or castle river, as it is called, is a valuable salmon  
fishery. From its central situation the town has been  
selected for the head quarters of the artillery forces  
attached to the batteries on the Foyle and Swilly; and  
the constabulary and revenue police force have likewise  
stations here. Several vessels are engaged in fishing  
for soles, plaice, and turbot, which are taken off this  
coast in large quantities, and oysters of a large size and  
good flavour abound in the Lough.

In the centre of the town stands the parish church,  
a very neat edifice, with a square tower (containing a  
good clock), surmounted by a spire. The other places  
of worship are a Presbyterian meeting house, a Roman  
Catholic chapel, and a chapel for Wesleyan Metho-  
dists. The general market day is Tuesday, and there  
is a market for grain every Friday. The principal fairs  
are May 9th and July 27th; there are several others of  
less importance held in the months of January, Feb-  
ruary, March, April, and September. The population  
of the town, in 1841, was 961.

**BLACKWATERTOWN AND LOUGHGALL.**

BLACKWATERTOWN, a post town or village, in  
the parish of Clonfeacle, barony and county of Armagh,  
88 miles N. by W. from Dublin, 39 S. W. from Belfast, 24  
N.W. from Newry, about 8 S. from Dungannon, between  
5 and 6 N.W. from Armagh, and 2 1/2 S. from Charlemont;  
situated on the northern bank of the Blackwater, from  
which stream the town derives its name. It lies on the  
road between Armagh and Dungannon, near the junc-  
tion of the river before named with the Ulster canal,  
and sloops of fifty tons burthen can deliver their cargoes  
at the quay—thus enjoying local facilities for a good  
trade, which, however, is but of a very limited nature.  
On the western side of the river, which is crossed by a  
stone bridge, is the ancient cemetery of Clonfeacle, the  
church of which being in ruins, another was erected at  
Benburb, now the parish church. A constabulary

police station, a dispensary and a national school are  
the only public establishments. Population of Clon-  
feacle parish, by the returns for 1841, 2,119, and that  
of Blackwatertown, 369.

About three miles from Blackwatertown is the post  
village and parish of LOUGHGALL, beautifully seated in  
a valley, surrounded by a fertile and well-cultivated  
country. One main street forms the town, the houses  
of which are tolerably well built, and there is a market-  
house—but no market is now held, neither fairs, two  
of which latter were formerly well attended. The  
church is a handsome building, in the early English  
style of architecture, with a square tower. A dispen-  
sary, and a school upon the national plan, are the only  
public institutions. Loughgall parish contained, in 1841,  
9,615 inhabitants, and the village 394 of that number.
