CARRICKFERGUS,

A VERY ancient market town, sea-port, county of itself, and parish, a parliamentary borough and the assize town of Antrim county, is 112 miles N. by E. from Dublin, 12 S. from Larne, and 10 N.E. by S. from Belfast; situated on the bay of its name, rendered memorable by the landing of King William in 1690, previous to the battle of the Boyne. The principal portion of the town stretches close along Belfast Lough, in the direction of east-north-east; while another main line of thoroughfare extends from the west and north-westward to Baltimore. It is divided into two sections—namely, Irish Quarter on the west, and Scotch Quarter on the East. The first-named, once called West Suburb, obtained its present appellation after the year 1677, when the then lord lieutenant, the intolerant Duke of Ormond, issued a proclamation commanding all Roman Catholics resident in cities, corporate towns and forts, to remove beyond the walls. The Scotch Quarter is occupied chiefly by fishermen, and had its name from a Scotch colony, who arrived about the year 1665 from Galloway and Argyleshire, and pursued the same occupation as their descendants do now. Most of the houses are built of stone, some are of brick, and the ancient ones, of which there are but few, consist of bricks in a frame of oak. The main street is narrow, as was formerly the case with all fortified places, but the more modern streets are comparatively spacious. Of the fortifications, including four strong gates, with which the town was formerly defended, only one of the latter—north gate, now remains. The castle, supposed to have been built by Hugh de Lacy in 1178, is a noble structure, holdly situated on a rock projecting into the sea; the inner yard, containing the barrack and different stores, is large and extensive, the walls are of an immense thickness, and the platform is furnished with a battery of twenty-two long twelve pounders; the magazine in the main building is bomb proof, and the different apartments upwards are occupied as stores for arms and other implements of war. The view from the top is singularly extensive and beautiful. This castle has been the scene of many conflicts, and has alternately been occupied by different contending parties. In the year 1760, being weakly garrisoned by about two hundred recruits, it was taken, after a brave resistance, by the French under the command of Mons. Thurot, who was afterwards killed, and whose squadron was taken by Commodore Elliott off Ramsey bay in the Isle of Man. The county of Antrim court-house and gaol, situate at the bottom of High street, constitute one pile of buildings, erected in 1777-9 at the cost of upwards of £21,000.; but the gaol is considered inadequate to the purposes of a county prison. The incorporation of Carrickfergus, as a county of itself, is ascribed to King John, but is not recognised by any existing charter earlier than one of Elizabeth. The corporation, according to charter, is styled 'the Mayor, Sheriffs, Burgesses and Commonalty of the Town of Carrickfergus,' and consists of the mayor, who is alderman, sixteen other aldermen, two sheriffs, who are burgesses, twenty-two other burgesses, and an indefinite number of freemen. James II., by charter, authorized a guildry, and some of the guilds can still be traced. The assizes and the sessions of the peace for the county of Antrim are held thrice a year, and petty sessions weekly. A tholsel court and a civil bill court are entitled to be held, the former twice weekly. The charter of Elizabeth confirmed to this borough the right of sending two representatives to the Irish Parliament, which it continued to exercise till the Union, since which period it has returned one to the Imperial Parliament—the present member is Peter Kirk, Esquire, of Thornfield, in this county, and Carlton Club, London. The borough, under the new parliamentary franchise, continues to have the same limits as before the passing of the boundary act: the constituency amounts to about thirteen hundred. The liberties of the town and county of the town of Carrickfergus extend four miles in all directions from the castle, distinct from, but locally in, the county of Antrim. The woollen manufacture, once of some importance here, has entirely declined; and the cotton trade that does exist, belongs more to the rural parts than to the town; and Belfast has become the great concentrated mart for the manufactures of an extensive district. The landing pier has been much improved of late, and vessels of one hundred tons and upwards can now discharge at it. The imports consist of coal, timber, slate, barley, and salt; and the exports of cattle and grain.

The parish church of Saint Nicholas occupies rising ground in a central situation; it has been alternately repaired and neglected, and although exhibiting marks of antiquity, possesses little that is interesting, except a few monumental memorials, the most remarkable and worthy of notice being one of the Chichester family. The Roman Catholic chapel is a plain building, situated in the western environs of the Irish quarter. The other places of worship are for Presbyterians (whose meeting-house is a very handsome one), for Independents, for Methodists, and for Covenanters. There are a free school under the national board; another established by the church society, and one for infants. The market, a good one, is held on Saturday, and the fairs on the 13th of May and 1st of November. The population of the county of the town of Carrickfergus, in 1841, was 9,379, and of the town itself 3,893 of that number.
