CARS.

CAVAN,

A MARKET and post town, the capital of the county of its name, formerly a parliamentary borough, is in the parish of Urney, barony of Upper Loughtree, 69 miles N.W. by N. from Dublin, 32 S.E. from Enniskillen, the like distance S.W. from Virginia, 15½ S.W. from Clones, and 9 S.E. from Belturbet; situated on the road from Dublin to Enniskillen, at the foot of an assemblage of small hills, and about 4½ miles east from Lough Otter. The town consists of two parallel streets, with a few smaller ones branching from them. In Farnham-street—named after the proprietor of the town, stands the new church, a very handsome structure; the goal, a commodious and secure building, constructed on the radiating and classification principle; the county court, or sessions house, a spacious edifice, embellished with a portico; and the 'Farnham Arms Hotel,' an excellently conducted family, commercial, and posting house. In the Main-street, opposite the post office, stands the other principal inn—the 'Commercial Hotel,' also an admirably regulated establishment; and in this street is the county infirmary, a very valuable institution; likewise the market house, some good private dwellings and well-furnished shops. In the modern part of the town a garden was laid out by the late Lady Farnham, as a means of inducing a popular taste for flowers and botany, and it is now maintained by Lord Farnham as a promenade for the inhabitants, under certain restrictions. On a hill, adjoining the town, is situated the infantry barracks; about a quarter of a mile to the north of it is the fever hospital, and about a quarter of a mile more distant is the union workhouse, erected in 1841. Though in the midst of a manufacturing district, and eligibly situated for the purposes of commerce, Cavan enjoys but a limited trade. A small river runs through the town, and after a course of about three miles, principally through the beautiful demesne of Farnham, it unites with the Ballyhays river, and then proceeds through Belturbet, a little below which the stream falls into Lough Erne, so that, at no very considerable expense, Cavan might enjoy a navigation for vessels of respectable tonnage, and a communication be effected with the canal between Lough Neagh and Lough Erne.

A charter, granted by James I., constituted Cavan a corporate and parliamentary borough; the corporation consists of a sovereign, two portreeves, twelve burgesses, and an indefinite number of freemen, assisted by a recorder, town clerk, and other officers. The regular appointment, however, of these officers has been discontinued for several years: the sovereign and his deputy are permanent, and are now the only representatives of the corporation. The assizes for the county are held here, as are the Hilary and Midsummer sessions, and petty sessions are held weekly. Cavan, under the charter referred to, became entitled to send two representatives to the Irish Parliament, and it continued to exercise that privilege until disfranchised by the Union. The county at large returns two members to the Imperial Parliament—their names, &c. are given at page 342.

The places of worship are the church before noticed; a handsome Roman Catholic chapel, erected in 1834; a Presbyterian meeting-house, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. About a quarter of a mile from the town is a classical school, chartered by Charles I., and its management, by a late act of parliament, transferred to a board of commissioners of education, the master being appointed by the Lord Lieutenant. The school-house, re-erected in 1819, in a beautiful situation, is a spacious building, calculated for the reception of one hundred pupils. The celebrated Dr. Sheridan, the friend and correspondent of Dean Swift, was for many years master of this school, and was frequently visited by the Dean. Several parochial and Sunday schools are maintained by subscription, and Lady Farnham munificently supports one for children of both sexes. A dispensary, and a loan fund, are the other institutions, besides those previously noticed. A portion of the country round Cavan is very fine, particularly about Farnham and Kilmore, two beautiful domains, the former belonging to Lord Farnham, and containing near three thousand acres, comprising the richest pastures and the greatest variety of scenery; the latter, not so extensive, to the Bishop of Kilmore; in other directions the soil is cold and sterile, but progressively being improved.
