

## CLOGHER AND FIVE-MILE TOWN.

**CLOGHER** is a small market town, the head of a diocese, and formerly a parliamentary borough, in the barony and parish of its name, county of Tyrone, 98 miles N. N. W. from Dublin, and 9 W. from Aughnacloy; situated on the road from the latter town to Enniskillen, on the banks of the Blackwater. This ancient episcopal city, now only a village in appearance, is said to have derived its name from a stone covered with gold, the *clogh-or*, or 'golden stone,' which, in Pagan times, is reported to have made oracular responses; and there is still a very ancient stone lying on the south side of the cathedral tower, which many believe to be the real *clogh-or*. The episcopal palace is a large and handsome edifice, close to the cathedral, on the south side of the town, and consists of a centre and two wings; it is entered by an elegant portico, supported by lofty fluted columns. The erection of this palace, was commenced by Lord Beresford, Primate of Armagh, while Bishop of Clogher, and completed by Lord R. P. Tottenham, the present bishop, in 1823. The cathedral, dedicated to Saint Macartin, and, from time immemorial the parish church, is a large and handsome cruciform structure, with a lofty square tower, rising from the west front. There are several elegant monuments, and the throne of the Bishop is very beautiful; besides which the interior is handsomely fitted up. Two Roman Catholic chapels, and a Presbyterian meeting-house, are the other places of worship. A union workhouse, and a dispensary, are the principal charities. The market is held on Saturday, and fairs on the 20th of every month. Clogher parish contained, in 1841, 17,813 inhabitants, and the town (or city) 762 of that number.

**FIVE-MILE TOWN**, or *Blessingbourn*, is a small market town, in the parish and barony of Clogher, county of Antrim, about 7 miles W. by S. from Clogher, situated on the confines of Fermanagh county, surrounded by an exceedingly fertile country. The place possesses no particular branch of trade; it is, however, certainly improving, and can boast of a very superior hotel and posting establishment, conducted by Mr. Menaul. The places of worship are a neat chapel of ease, two Presbyterian meeting-houses, and a Methodist chapel. The market is on Friday. Fairs the first Monday after the 17th of January, the latter end of the months of March and May, the first Saturday after the 12th of August, November 22nd, and the three Fridays next before Christmas-day. Population, in 1841, 693.

## CLONES, NEWTOWN-BUTLER AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**CLONES** is a market town and a parish, the latter partly in the barony of Clonkelly, county of Fermanagh, and partly in the baronies of Monaghan and Dartry, county of Monaghan, 76 miles N. N. W. from Dublin, 23 E. S. E. from Enniskillen, 16 N. from Cavan, 13 S. E. from Belturbet, 12½ S. S. W. from Monaghan, and 11 N. by W. from Cootehill; situated at the western verge of Monaghan county, and at the intersection of the road from Monaghan to Belturbet, with that from Enniskillen to Shircock. The ancient name of this place was *Clann-hinis*, i.e., the 'Island of Retreat,' it having formerly been surrounded by water; and more recently it was called *Clonish*, or *Cloneish*. An abbey was founded here in the early part of the sixth century, by Saint Tigernach, or Tierney; the manor of the abbey, still called Saint Tierney, is now the property of Sir Thomas Barrett Lennard, Bart. The town consists chiefly of five streets, which converge toward the marketplace, a spacious triangular area, called the Diamond, on the west side of which stands the market house, a handsome building, on which is cut, in stone, the arms of the Daere family. In the northern angle of the same area is an ancient market cross, consisting of a shaft, twelve feet in height, supported on a flight of steps; both the pillar and its top are sculptured with figures in relief, and present, as a whole, an interesting relic of antiquity. Near the cross is the parish church, and the Diamond contains also two of the principal hotels; an establishment of the northern Banking Company, and agency offices of the Patriotic and Standard Assurance Companies. The trade of the place is principally retail; but there is a considerable iron foundry at STONE BRIDGE, in which are manufactured spades, shovels, and other agricultural implements; and in the neighbourhood are extensive corn mills. Petty sessions are held every alternate Friday; a court for the manor of Saint Tierney, by the seneschal, for the recovery of debts under £2; and courts also for the manors of Rodea and Shanlick.

The parish church, before mentioned as situated in the market place, is a handsome structure, with a square tower, containing a clock and bell. In the Roman Catholic divisions this parish forms two benefices—East Clones and West Clones; there are
