place, independent of that connected with agriculture, and some linen woven by the inhabitants at their own houses, in the town and country round. Petty sessions are held monthly in the court-house; a court for the manor of Pelipar every third Thursday, in which cognizance of debts is taken under 40s.; and there is a constabulary station in the town.

The parish church, situated at the upper end of the town, on the Maghera road, is a handsome cruciform structure of stone. The other places of worship are a spacious Roman Catholic chapel, and a new Presbyterian meeting-house. There are schools in the parish for the education of both male and female children gratuitously; and from a dispensary, in the town, remedies

dial aid is imparted to the indigent sick. The interesting remains of the abbey church (supposed to have been founded at the beginning of the eleventh century) crown a perpendicular rock, 200 feet in height above the river Roe, and appear alike conspicuous and picturesque. About a quarter of a mile from the town is an old burying-ground, where the remains of Quentin O'Kane, one of the Irish chieftains before the time of Cromwell, together with seven of his sons, were interred in the same tomb. The market is held on Saturday. Fairs May 25th and October 25th, and on the second Tuesday in the other months of the year. The parish contained, in 1841, 5,169 inhabitants, and the town 1,016 of that number.

ENNISKILLEN AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

ENNISKILLEN is a market town, parliamentary borough, and a parish, the latter partly in the barony of Magheraboy, but chiefly in that of Tyrconnedy, county of Fermanagh, of which it is the capital and chief town; 101 miles N.W. by N. from Dublin, 93 W. by S. from Belfast, 32 N. by W. from Cavan, 38 E. from Sligo, 26 E. from Manor-Hamilton, 10½ N. by E. from Swanlinbar, 10 W. N.W. from Lisnaskea, and 7½ W.N.W. from Maguire's Bridge; beautifully situated on an island in the narrowest part of Lough Erne, or rather in a strait several miles in length, which connects the great northern and southern expanses of the lake, and in which are numerous inlets. Mr. Inglis thus notices Enniskillen—"The approach to Enniskillen, from Swanlinbar, struck me greatly. A rich, broken, and beautiful country lies on either side of the road; a mountain outline bounds the greater part of the horizon, and the town of Enniskillen itself rises on the opposite side of a broad sheet of water, covering a considerable extent of elevated ground and presenting a bold front of strong bastions and grey walls. On the opposite banks of the water, on both sides the town, the scenery is of the finest description." The Fort-hill, at the east entrance

of the town, has been beautifully laid out with walks and planted, as a promenade, for the inhabitants; and a monument is about to be erected on its summit to the memory of the late General the Hon. Sir G. Lowry Cole, K.B. uncle to the present Earl of Enniskillen, the first stone of which was laid on the 5th of June, 1845. The prospects from this hill are of the finest kind, embracing a full view of the town and a well-cultivated country around for many miles, embellished by numerous seats of the gentry. The island of Deverish, about two miles across the lower lake, is a beautiful and conspicuous object, and by far the most interesting of the islands of Lough Erne. Upon it are the remains of several ancient churches, and a round tower considered in its restored state to be the most perfect, as well as the most beautiful in Ireland. This island is still used as a burial place by many families of the town and neighbourhood. Previous to the time of James I Enniskillen was merely a stronghold of Maguire, chieftain of Fermanagh, who had a castle here, but it subsequently became conspicuous in Irish history. The 'Enniskilleners' are famed for the decisive and prominent part they acted in the wars of the revolution, from almost

DUNGIVEN.

A SMALL market town and a parish, in the barony of Kenaght, county of Derry, is 133 miles N.W. from Dublin, 108 N.W. by W. from Belfast, 19 E. S.E. from Londonderry, the like distance S. S.W. from Coleraine, 23 N. by W. from Cookstown, 11 W.N.W. from Maghera, the same distance W.S.W. from Garvagh, and 9 S. from Newtown-linavady; situated on the road from Armagh to Londonderry, along the summit of a ridge of sandstone, the sides of which form considerable declivities. Lofly eminences surround the town, and in these eleva-

tions are frequently found some fine specimens of white mountain crystals. The town, anciently called *Baile-an-Muaidh*, i.e. 'the town on the ridge of the hill,' consists of one long straggling street, and of two short ones; and although most of the habitations are modern, the place cannot be said to be altogether prepossessing in its aspect. The castle or bawn of Dungiven, built by the Skinners' Company in the reign of James I, stands at the head of the town, and commands a circle of admirable views. But little trade belongs to the
