

the moment of the declaration of hostilities up to the conclusive battle of the Boyne; and they claim, equally with the men of Londonderry, the fame of having secured to William III the crown of the three kingdoms. In the battle of Lisnaskea, the inferiority of the Enniskilleners in numbers was counterbalanced by superior resolution and energy; they defeated and pursued their assailants, granting quarter to none but officers. Full two thousand were slain in the engagement, and of five hundred who plunged into the lake, one only, it is recorded, escaped drowning; about the same number of officers were taken prisoners, among whom was their general, Macarthy.

The town is remarkable for its respectable and thriving appearance, and for the advantages it possesses in the navigation of the lake, and the facility afforded for excursions among the rich and beautiful scenery for which it is distinguished. It has increased considerably of late years, and is further improving—Willoughby-place and Brook-place are among the more recent erections. The principal street takes an irregular course across the island, from the bridge which connects it with the mainland on the east, to that which crosses the opposite channel on the west. Several smaller streets diverge from the main one. Contiguous to the eastern bridge is a suburb in the townland of Tonystick, and beyond the western bridge is another suburb in the parish of Rossory. At the east entrance of the town, upon a cheerful eminence, stands the county infirmary, a large and handsome structure. Opposite to this is the county gaol, a spacious edifice: within the last few years it has received considerable additions and repairs, rendering it a commodious and secure prison. The county court-house, situated in the Main-street, is a very handsome building, with a portico in front: the interior contains court-rooms and separate offices for the officials of the county. At the western extremity of the town are the infantry and artillery barracks, the former suitable for the accommodation of five companies; the latter for a troop of horse and brigade of artillery: at present the artillery barrack is used as an ordnance store and military hospital. In the centre of the town is the market-house, a spacious building, with a fine room over it. In this apartment the judges of assize are entertained; and it is used occasionally for balls, exhibitions, &c. The lower part is now occupied as shops. The trade of Enniskillen is principally of a general and domestic character; the main thoroughfares abound in respectable well-filled shops, and there are several good inns—among the latter the 'Imperial Hotel' is an admirably conducted one for families as well as commercial gentlemen, besides being a good posting-house. The manufacture of leather and cutlery is carried on here, the former extensively, the latter of a superior description. An extensive ale and porter brewery, and the corn trade, are the other prominent branches; in the latter a considerable export business

is done with Sligo and other places. The Ulster Banking Company and the Provincial Bank of Ireland have branch establishments in the town, and there is a bank for savings. Lines of railway connecting this town with Londonderry and with Newry, and also Dundalk, having received the sanction of the legislature, will be actively proceeded with, and much benefit to the town is anticipated from their completion: another line is also projected to Sligo. The bed of the lake is now being deepened, in order that the steam-boat plying between this place and Belturbet and the Ulster canal may pass under the bridge, and proceed also to Belleek. Two newspapers are published in the town weekly—the 'Enniskillen Press,' and the 'Fermanagh Reporter;' they are ably conducted and widely-circulated journals. The town was incorporated by charter, granted in the 10th of James I, under the title of the 'Provost, Free Burgesses, and Commonalty of the borough of Enniskillen.' The government is vested in the provost and burgesses, who appoint officers, and manage the property of the corporation. The assizes for the county, and quarter sessions of the peace, are held in the county court house; and a borough court, held every Thursday, has jurisdiction to the amount of £3. 6s. 8d. late currency. The charter of James conferred upon the corporation the privilege of sending two members to the Irish Parliament, which they continued to do till the Union, since which time but one has been returned to the Imperial Parliament. The present representative is the Honourable Henry Arthur Cole (Florence Court), brother to the Earl of Enniskillen, who takes his title from this town.

The church, situated a little below the market house, is a handsome building, with a square tower, containing a peal of eight bells and a good clock—the tower being surmounted by a well-proportioned spire. The other places of worship are a large Roman Catholic chapel, a Presbyterian meeting-house, and a chapel each for Primitive and Wesleyan Methodists. The benevolent and remedial institutions comprise a fever hospital and an infirmary, and schools, for the free education of both sexes, under the National Board of Education and the Church Society. Near the town, beautifully situated on a rising ground, is Enniskillen Royal School, supported by a grant of Charles I. The rental of land, belonging to this establishment, which amounts to nearly £3,000. per annum, is now administered by the Board of Education. The school-house is a spacious building, capable of accommodating upwards of one hundred boarders. The market days are Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday; the two first are for butter, of which large quantities are sold to the merchants, who attend here from different parts of the country. Thursday and Saturday markets are for the usual commodities, Thursday being the principal. The entire parish of Enniskillen contained, in 1841, 14,678 inhabitants, and the town 5,686 of that number.
