GARVAGH AND BALLINAMEEN.

GARVAGH is a small market town, in the parish of Errigal, barony of Coleraine, county of Londonderry, 152 miles N. from Dublin, 70 N. W. by N. from Belfast, 11 S. from Coleraine, and about the same distance N. from Maghera; situated on the road from Armagh to Coleraine, on the southern head stream of the Agivey river. An English gentleman, of the name of Canning, obtained a grant of the manor of Garvagh early in the seventeenth century, and his descendant, George Canning, Esq. was created Baron Garvagh in the peerage of Ireland. A distinguished and near relation of this nobleman was the celebrated statesman and prime minister, the Right Hon. George Canning, who died in 1827, and another relation is the Right Hon. Sir Stratford Canning. This is a neat and respectably inhabited little town, consisting of one principal and two smaller

streets. It has no particular trade; that which it does possess is of a home character, assisted by an opulent neighbourhood. The places of worship are the small parish church of Errigal, a Roman Catholic chapel, two Presbyterian meeting-houses, and one for a seceding congregation. The market is held on Friday. Fairs January 1st, May 23rd, July 26th, November 5th, and the third Friday in each of the other months. Population of the town 851.

BALLINAMEEN is a small village, in the parish of Deserthoghill, same barony as Garvagh, but a short distance from that town. The parish church is a large structure, erected in 1784, one mile south of the old church. In the parish is a meeting-house for Presbyterians, and two schools under the Mercers' Company. Population of Ballinameen village 192.

To DUNGANNON, the Royal Mail (from Coleraine), every day at twelve; goes through Maghera, Tubbermore, Magherafelt, Cookstown & Stewartstown.
To PORTSTEWART (during the summer months), a Caravan (from Cookstown), every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at half-past twelve; goes thro' Coleraine.

GILFORD AND LOUGHBRICKLAND.

GILFORD is a post and fair town, in the parish of Tullylish, barony of Lower Iveagh, county of Down, 84 miles N. from Dublin, 14 S. from Newry, 10 S. W. from Dromore, the same distance from Moira, 5 S. from Warrentown, and the like distance N. W. from Banbridge; pleasantly situated at the eastern verge of the county, on the river Banu, and on the road to Tanderagee and Portadown. The town, which lies on both sides of the river (crossed by a stone bridge of two arches), is the joint property of Mrs. Burgess and Mrs. Ormsby; it is deeply interested in the linen manufacture, and is famous for its bleach grounds, and the beautiful country by which they are surrounded. The canal from Lough Neagh to Newry passes within half a mile of the town, and on its banks, at that part, is a wharf and warehouses. Petty sessions are held on alternate Wednesdays; and a constabulary police station is in the town. The places of worship are the parish church of Tullylish, a plain stone building, a Presbyterian meeting-house, and a Wesleyan chapel. Gilford gives the inferior title of baron to the Earl of Clanwilliam. A chalybeate spring rises in the neighbourhood, whose waters are said to possess the same

properties as those of Pyrmont. Fairs are held June 21st and November 21st; they are toll free, and well attended. Population of the town, in 1841, 643.

LOUGHBRICKLAND is likewise a small post town, in the parish of Agherderg, same barony as Gilford, 4 miles S. S. E. from that town; situated on the road from Newry to Belfast, and on the lake from which its name is derived, which lake is said to have obtained its appellation from the speckled fish with which it formerly abounded. The town, which has a cheerful and thriving aspect, consists of one principal and two smaller streets, the houses of the former being well built, and some of them handsome. The parish church of Agherderg is rather a handsome structure, having a square tower, surmounted by an octagonal spire; it stands in the centre of the town, and opposite to it is a neat Roman Catholic chapel. A Presbyterian meeting-house, and a chapel each for Covenanters and Wesleyan Methodists, are the other places of worship; and national and parochial schools, for gratuitous instruction, are the principal institutions of benevolence. Fairs are held on the third Tuesday, monthly. Population of the town, in 1841, 647.
