KILLYLEAGH,

A MARKET and sea-port town (formerly a parliamentary borough), and a parish—the latter partly in the barony of Upper Castlereagh, but chiefly in that of Dufferin, county of Down, 11 miles N. by E. from Dublin, 20 S.E. from Belfast, 11 E. from Ballynahinch, and 6 N. from Downpatrick; situated at the head of a creek on the west shore of Lough Strangford, on the road from Downpatrick to Newtownards. The bay or creek has been, within these few years, improved as a harbour by Lord Dufferin, the chief proprietor of the town, and now vessels of considerable burthen may lie sheltered from all winds: it is, however, difficult of access to large ships, from a dangerous bar that runs across the mouth of the lough. The pier has also been rebuilt by the noble proprietor, and has been the means of increasing the amount of its shipping business. The exports are chiefly farm and agricultural produce, of which large quantities, especially of corn, are annually exported; the imports are cotton, wool, coal, iron, salt, and general merchandise. An extensive cotton manufactory was established here in 1825, to which has been subsequently added that of linen yarn, the entire giving employment to many of the industrious class. The inhabitants received a charter from James I, which, among other privileges, conferred that of sending two members to the Irish Parliament, which they

continued to do until the Union deprived them of that political franchise. The Hamiltons, created Lords of Clancloye, and subsequently Earls of Clanbrassell, formerly resided in an ancient castle at one extremity of the town; it is now the occasional residence of Archibald Hamilton, Esq. who, with Lord Dufferin, owns the town and estates contiguous. The seneschal of the manor, appointed by Mr. Hamilton, holds a manor court, every three weeks, for the recovery of debts under £10. and a court leet annually; and the magistrates assemble in petty session every alternate week. The church is a handsome cruciform structure, with a tower, surmounted by a spire of good proportions. It was originally erected in 1640, and, in 1812, was rebuilt, when the tower and spire was added,—towards the expense of which Lord Dufferin contributed a large sum. The other places of worship are a small neat Roman Catholic chapel, a Presbyterian meeting-house, and one for Methodists. A national school, and one supported by the Dowager Lady Dufferin, are the principal benevolent institutions. Sir Hans Sloane, the celebrated naturalist and physician, was born here on the 16th of April, 1660. The market is held on Friday. Fairs April 10th, May 19th, October 11th, and December 15th. The parish contained, in 1841, 6,688 inhabitants, and the town 1,116 of that number.

KILLYBEGS AND DUNKINEELY.

KILLYBEGS is a sea-port, market town and parish (formerly a parliamentary borough), partly in the barony of Boyleagh, but chiefly in that of Banagh, 157 miles N. by W. from Dublin, 174 W. from Donegal, and 9 S. from Ardara; situated on the south-east coast of the county, on the east side, and near the head of the beautiful harbour of its name. The bay is one of the finest and safest in the north of Ireland, being sheltered by a noble range of hills, and vessels of almost any tonnage can anchor here at low water. The trade of the port and town is but limited—the exports are agricultural produce; the imports, timber, coal, slate, and groceries. The salmon and herring fisheries are productive, and, in their respective seasons, furnish em-

ployment to a considerable number of the inhabitants. The town obtained a charter from James I in the 13th year of his reign, and the inhabitants were incorporated by the designation of the 'Provost, Free Burgesses, and Commonalty of the Borough of Calebegg.' Under the charter the corporation became privileged to send two members to the Irish Parliament, and it exercised such right until the Union disfranchised the borough. A court of record formerly held has been discontinued, and petty sessions are held but irregularly. A constabulary police force is stationed in the town. The places of worship are the parish church, a small edifice, situate 'on rising ground, and a Roman Catholic chapel. A dispensary and a public free school are the
