**MAGHERA,**

**A** MARKET town and parish, in the barony of  
Loughinsholin, county of Londonderry, is 122 miles  
N. by W. from Dublin, 46 N. by W. from Belfast, 43 N.  
from Armagh, 20 S. from Coleraine, 10 N. by W. from  
Moneymore, 11 S. E. by S. from Dungiven, 9 S. W. from  
Kilrea, 8 W. S. W. from Portlengone, 7 1/2 N. N. W. from  
Magherafelt, 7 W. N. W. from Bellaghy, 6 N. W. from  
Castle-Dawson, and 3 1/2 S. N. E. from Tubbermore; situ-  
ated at the intersection of the road from Coleraine to  
Armagh and Dublin with the direct road from London-  
derry to Belfast. It is a place of comparatively high  
antiquity, and is frequently noticed in ecclesiastical re-  
cords, as well as those of turbulence and bloodshed. It  
was burned, in 1641, by the insurgents under Macdon-  
nell, and was assaulted by the Irish adherents of James  
II, when the inhabitants were compelled to abandon  
their houses to the spoil of the troops, and seek  
refuge in Derry city. During the disturbances of 1798,  
it enjoyed comparative tranquillity, and has since been  
gradually increasing in extent, population, and com-  
mercial importance. The town consists of one long  
and spacious street, from which several smaller ones  
branch off; the houses, which are chiefly built of stone,  
and are modern buildings, have a respectable appear-  
ance. It is a place of considerable thoroughfare, which  
occasions a certain amount of local traffic, but its linen  
trade is the staple, and large quantities of goods are  
transferred at the weekly markets. A large distillery

is in the town; and Mr. Morrison's Hotel here is, per-  
haps, one of the best regulated and handsomely fitted  
up establishments in the province, and combines mo-  
derate charges with assiduous attention. The market-  
house is a large and neat building, erected in 1833, in  
the centre of the town; over it is a spacious room,  
wherein petty sessions are held on alternate Saturdays,  
and a manorial court monthly, in which debts under  
40s. are recoverable. A chief constabulary police  
station is established in the town.

The parish church, erected in 1820, is a rather hand-  
some stone structure, with a square embattled tower,  
crowned with pinnacles: the east window is embel-  
lished with stained glass, presented by the lady of the  
late Bishop Knox. There are places of worship for  
Presbyterians, and about a mile and a half from the  
town is a Roman Catholic chapel. The Church Edu-  
cation Society and the National Board have each a  
school here, in which children of both sexes are edu-  
cated. The steeple and part of the walls of the old  
church are still remaining; when perfect, and before  
the Reformation, it belonged to the Roman Catholics.  
Half a mile distant are the ruins of a friary, now known  
by the name of Mullagh church. The market days are  
Tuesday and Friday—the latter for corn. Fairs the last  
Tuesday in every month. The parish of Maghera con-  
tained, in 1841, 14,571 inhabitants, and the town 1,123  
of that number.
