The places of worship are the parish church of Ballyphillip, a neat structure; a Roman Catholic chapel, a very large building; and meeting-houses respectively for Presbyterians, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The charitable institutions consist of a dispensary and two public schools—one endowed, the other under the national board. Andrew Nugent, Esq. the proprietor of Portaferry, has a fine mansion and demesne immediately contiguous to the town. The house, an elegant tasteful building, is seated on a gentle eminence commanding one of the most extensive, varied and beautiful prospects, that can well be imagined. The demesne, which is diversified with charming walks and plantations command an extensive view of the surrounding country, highly cultivated and improved, and of the lake and town of Strangford, with the mountains of Mourne, the Scottish hills, and even the more distant land of the Isle of Man. From the quay an entrance to the grounds is gained by a delightful walk or mall, open at all times to the inhabitants and strangers. The remains of the ancient castle built by the family of the Savages, who assisted the renowned John De Courcy in the conquest of Ulster, in the 12th century, are still to be seen in the neighbourhood, and near them the ruins of an old chapel, roofed with stone. The market is held on Saturday, and the fairs on the second Tuesday, monthly. The town of Portaferry contained, in 1841, 2,107 inhabitants.

STRANGFORD, a small sea-port, is in the parish of Ballyculter, barony of Lecale, same county as Portaferry, situated immediately opposite to that town, and consequently on the western shore of the strait or channel before described. It is small, but there is a quay, and the place participates in similar traffic and trades, but far more limited, with those which flourish in its opposite and more important neighbour. The town is the property of the Right Honourable Lord de Ros, whose seat, Old Court, is adjoining to it; and about a

mile distant is the lovely demesne of Castleward, the seat of Lord Viscount Bangor, which, for the delightful situation it occupies, the surpassingly beautiful views it commands, and the elegant taste displayed in the park, gardens and grounds, is excelled by few in this country. The town, which derives considerable consequence from the vicinity of the fine Lough of its name, contains a number of good houses, an excellent inn, 'Stockdale's Hotel,' and a custom house—from the latter, which is situated on the quay, a charming view of Portaferry, of the Lough, and of the country on the south and west is commanded. The town has a station of the constabulary police and of the coast guard. The places of worship are a chapel of ease to the parish of Ballyculter; and one each for Roman Catholics, Presbyterians, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. Two schools are supported respectively by Lord de Ros and the Hon. Harriet Ward. Fairs, February 4th, August 12th and November 8th. Population 571.

KIRCUBBIN is a small market town, in the parish of Innishargy, barony of Aards, same county as Portaferry, between six and seven miles north from that town; seated on the east shore of Lough Strangford, on the road to Belfast, through Newtownards. Previous to 1790 there were not more than half a dozen houses in the place; there are now twenty times that number, and it is a thriving little town, owning a pleasant situation, and bids fair to increase in extent and population. There is an excellent landing place from the Lough, and every facility of conveyance is afforded by good roads, and by water, upon the Lough, and coastwise. A chapel of ease, and a Presbyterian meeting-house are the places of worship. The market-house was erected by the Hon. Richard Ward. The market is held every third Wednesday; and the fairs on the 28th of the months of April, May, August and November, and on the last Wednesday of the other months. Population of the town 623.

PORTAFERRY, STRANGFORD AND KIRCUBBIN.

PORTAFERRY is a thriving sea-port and market town, partly in the parish of Ardquin, and partly in that of Ballyphillip, barony of Ards, county of Down, 102 and 129 miles respectively by different routes N.N.E. from Dublin, 29 S.E. by S. from Belfast, 19 S. by E. from Newtownards, 8 N.E. from Downpatrick, and 4 1/2 E.S.E. (by water) from Killyleagh; situated on the eastern shore of the strait to the sea, that forms the entrance to Strangford Lough—which channel is half a mile across at the narrowest part. Through this inlet the tide rushes both at ebb and flow, at the rate of six miles an hour, so that vessels or boats are frequently carried by the rapidity of the current far away from their place of destination: thus from the strength of the current the name *Strang-ford*, and hence, by corruption, Strangford is derived. The bar, a long ledge of rocks, bare at half ebb, lies about three miles south-east of the town, towards the main sea, and is dangerous to vessels making for the Lough, from the violence of the current. At Portaferry is a good quay, where

vessels of light burthen can discharge their cargoes. There is a considerable trade in corn and agricultural produce; and that in coal and timber is of great importance, and the merchants and ship owners of the port are highly respectable. The embroidering of muslin is the occupation of numerous females, in the town and neighbourhood, and there are several agents in that branch established here for the Glasgow houses. Along the adjacent coast and in the Lough a productive herring fishery is carried on, which, in the season—that is, in the months of June to September inclusive, give employment to numerous snacks and a great number of men. The town consists of a small square, three streets, and a range of houses along the quay. The market-house, situated in the square, is a very commodious building; in the upper portion an apartment is appropriated to the use of the magistrates, who hold petty sessions there every alternate Monday. Mr. Coates' hotel, the 'Harp,' is a remarkably comfortable and respectably conducted establishment.
