RAPHOE,

THE seat of a diocese, and a market town, is in the parish and barony of its name, county of Donegal; 138 miles N.W. from Dublin, 89 and 108 respectively, by different routes, W.N.W. from Belfast, 15 S.W. from Londonderry, 10 N.E. from Ballybofey, 8 S.E. from Letterkenny, the same distance E. from Stranorlar, and 5 1/2 W.N.W. from Lifford; situated on the road from Stranorlar to Londonderry, and environed by a beautifully diversified surface abounding in undulations, and occasionally running into considerable eminences. The soil around is fertile, well cultivated, and planted with sufficient wood, to embellish the general scenery. The town, which is tolerably well built, consists of one main and several minor streets, with a large central square, called the Diamond—in this area is situated the market-house and shambles, and at its northern angle stands the cathedral: a handsome stone edifice, with a square tower ninety feet high, containing a clock. The date when the main body of the church was erected, is unknown, but supposed to be in the eleventh century; the tower was added by Bishop Forster, in 1737, as appears inscribed on a stone over the door. The episcopal palace, formerly a strong castle, stands about a quarter of a mile from the town, and is a handsome and spacious castellated building, pleasantly situated in tastefully disposed grounds, commanding an extensive view of the country. It is the property and residence of William Kerr, Esq. who,

with a laudable desire to promote industry among the poor of the town and neighbourhood, has set up a number of looms for weaving of cotton, whereby nearly one hundred persons find employment. The articles chiefly manufactured are checks and cross-overs; besides which, forty or fifty females are employed in shirt-making.

The See of Raphoe appears to have originated with Saint Eunan, who became the first bishop, and converted the church of the monastery into a cathedral. In 1835 the See was united to that of Derry; and it now one of the ten suffragan bishopricks that constitute the ecclesiastical province of Armagh. There is a Roman Catholic chapel; and the Presbyterians have two meeting-houses, and the covenanters one. The charitable and educational establishments comprise the royal school, founded by Charles I., one under the national board of education; an asylum, founded by bishop Forster, for four clergymen's widows, and a dispensary. The general weekly market, tolerably well attended, is held on Saturday; and there are large markets or fairs on the first Saturday in the months of January, February, March, April, November and December, for cattle, pigs, &c. The chartered or annual fairs, are May 1st, June 22d, August 27th and November 4th, also for cattle, &c. The parish of Raphoe contained in 1841, 5,691 inhabitants, including 1,362 resident in the town.

RANDALSTOWN,

A MARKET town (formerly a parliamentary borough), is in the parish of Drumman, barony of Upper Toome, county of Antrim; 110 miles S. from Dublin, 21 1/2 N.W. by W. from Belfast, 9 S. from Ballymena, 6 1/2 E. from Toome-Bridge, and 5 N. by W. from Antrim; seated on the river Maie, on the roads respectively from Banbridge to Coleraine, and from Belfast to Londonderry, and two miles north from the nearest part of Lough Neagh. The Main is crossed at the town by a substantial stone bridge of nine arches, and by two others, in Lord O'Neill's domain, in the vicinity. This beautiful demesne, which occupies most of the vale southward to Lough Neagh, is richly wooded, and constitutes a most attractive feature in the prospect of the glen. The town itself has a pleasant site and a neat appearance. In Main-street is the market-house, a handsome building, with an assembly room over it;

and on the banks of the Main are cotton mills; the latter furnishing with employment a considerable number of the inhabitants. Charles II. constituted Randalstown a free borough, and gave to the inhabitants the privilege of sending two members to the Irish Parliament; but it does not appear that any corporation was ever embodied, and, at the Union, the borough was disfranchised. Petty sessions are held every alternate Thursday; and a court leet annually. The parish church of Drumman, a handsome structure, is situated in the town, and there are also three Presbyterian meeting-houses, and a Roman Catholic chapel. A dispensary and schools for the poor, are the principal charitable establishments. The weekly market is held on Wednesday, and one in each month on the first Wednesday. Fairs, July 16th and November 1st. The town contained, in 1841, 588 inhabitants.
