ARKLOW

Is a sea-port, market town and parish, in the county of Wicklow, 46 miles from Dublin, 11 s.e. from Rath-
drum, and 10 n. from Gorey; situated on the shore of
St. George's Channel, close to the border of Wexford
county, and at the mouth of the river Ovea. The town
consists mainly of one long street, tolerably well paved,
the church and court-house being conspicuous orna-
ments; but that portion of the town near the sea is
composed of sorry huts or cabins, occupied by fisher-
men. It was during an attack upon Arklow, by the
insurgents in 1798, that their renowned leader, Father
Murphy, was slain; after which calamitous loss to the
rebels they retreated to Gorey. Near the barrack stands
an ivy-covered tower, the last remnant of a castle, built
by a member of the Ormonde family, about seven hun-
dred years ago; one of whom still retains the royalty of
Arklow, although the principal emoluments of the
estates belong to the Earl of Carysfort. A memorial
court for the recovery of small debts is held in this
castle six times a year. The herring fishery, formerly
so productive, has, for several years past, yielded no-
thing, the fish having deserted this coast, which has
been calamitous to the numerous fishermen; but oysters
are obtained in great plenty. The energetic measure

now in progress, for the improvement of the harbour,
will, if successful, elevate Arklow into a trading port,
and impart an impetus to its commerce, and give prosperity
to the inhabitants.
The places of worship are the parish church, with a
handsome pinnacled tower; a neat and capacious Catho-
lic chapel, and one for the Wesleyan methodists. There
is an 'Incorporated Society of Dublin' school, the
school-room being granted rent free by the Hon. Ad-
miral Proby; upwards of 100 boys receive a good Eng-
lish scriptural education here. Miss Proby, the admiral's
daughter, maintains several female schools in Arklow
and the neighbourhood. There is a national school, an
infants' school, and a superior private school, conducted
by Mr. Healy, at Elton House, Lamberton. A fever
hospital, a dispensary, and a bank for savings, are the
other institutions.
One mile to the west of the town, on the bank of the
river Ovea, is Shelton Abbey, the beautiful seat of the
Earl of Wicklow, where James II. lodged one night in
the year 1690, on his way to Waterford, after the battle
of the Boyne; and on the opposite side stands Glenmatt
Castle, late the delightful and romantic seat of the Earl
of Carysfort, now the residence of Admiral Proby, bro-

ther to the noble earl. The beautiful scenery of the
vale of Ovea, rich with mineral ores, including the
romantic 'Meeting of the Waters,' so sweetly sung by
Moore, attract numbers to Arklow during the summer,
for whose accommodation Mr. Kinsey's Hotel, among
others, has been tastefully fitted up, the windows of
the bed chambers commanding rich prospects; there is

also an excellent commercial room, and commodious
stabling. Mr. Jenkinson's also affords excellent ac-
commodation. The market is held on Thursday. Fairs
January 11th, March 22nd, April 19th, May 15th, June
28th, August 9th, September 23th, and November 15th.
In 1841, the population of the parish of Arklow was
6,237, and that of the town 3,254.
