BALLYMAHON

IS a market and post town, in the parish of Shrule,
 barony of Rathellagh, county of Longford, 66 miles w.
 from Dublin, 17 w. from Mullingar, 12 s. from Long-
 ford, and the same distance N.E. from Athlone. The
 town, which is the property of M. W. Shuldham, Esq.,
 is tolerably well built, and lately much improved, con-
 sists principally of one main street, running from north
 to south. The Inney, which flows through the town,
 abounds with salmon trout and eels in their season;
 is crossed by an ancient stone bridge of five arches, and
 on its banks are several extensive corn mills. The
 welfare of the place is mainly derived from its situation
 on the river, from its being the centre of an exceed-
 ingly respectable neighbourhood, together with its ex-
 cellent corn market and well attended fairs. In a neat
 court-house, erected in 1826, sessions are held four
 times a year, and petty sessions every alternate Friday.

The church, a modern neat edifice, with a tower at
 the west end, contains an excellent clock, and is sur-
 mounted by a graceful spire. There is also a spaci-
 ous and commodious chapel for Roman Catholics.
 The educational institutions consist of a free school,
 and one on the national plan. A dispensary for the sick
 poor, and barracks, both for the county and revenue
 police, are the other public establishments. Goldsmith,
 the poet, was educated in Ballymahon, by the Rev.
 Mr. Hughes, vicar of Shrule; and Lissoy and Police,
 two villages in the neighbourhood, contend for the
 honour of being the identical spot described by the poet
 as 'Sweet Auburn, loveliest village of the plain,' in his
 delightful poem of the 'Deserted village.' The market
 is held on Thursday, and fairs on the Thursday before
 Ash Wednesday, May 11th, August 11th, and November
 21st. The population in 1841 was 1,229.

BALLINAKILL

IS a small market town, in the parish of Dysart-
 Gallen, barony of Collingagh, Queen's county, 62 miles
 s.w. from Dublin, and 18 s. from Kilkenny; situated
 near the border of Kilkenny county, on the main road
 between Athy and Cashel. Prior to the Union, this
 place sent two members to the Irish parliament, and
 had a considerable woollen trade, which is entirely
 fallen to decay. On approaching the town, by the
 Dublin road, the stranger is attracted by the neat, mo-
 derately built church and steeple, erected in 1821, the
 eastern window of which is very curious. Adjoining
 the church is the Catholic chapel, a handsome building.
 The ruins of the old castle are an object of attention—
 it was here that general Preston, after the surrender
 of Cullinstil, sat down before this fortress, which im-
 mediately surrendered. A market is held on Saturday,
 and fairs, January 16th, February 16th, March 22d,
 May 13th, July 13th, and Sept. 16th. Population 1,540.

BALLYRAGGET

IS a small town and parish, in the barony of Fass-
 ading, county of Kilkenny, 61 miles s.w. from Dublin,
 12 s.w. from Carlow, 10 s.w. from Kilkenny, and be-
 tween 5 and 6 miles s.w. by w. from Castle-Comer;
 pleasantly situated near the river Nore, which is crossed
 by a neat stone bridge of ten arches. The town con-
 sists of one principal street, with several smaller ones
 diverging from it. At a period not very distant, the
 branches of brewing and distilling were carried on here
 extensively; but from the early march of temperance,
 or some other cause not accounted for, its trade is now

but inconsiderable. Petty sessions are held here every
 alternate Wednesday. There is no Protestant church
 within three miles of the place, but service is performed
 for the few, in the faith of the establishment, in a pri-
 vate house. The Catholic chapel, erected in 1844, is a
 very handsome and spacious building. A charity school,
 on the national plan, for instructing children of both
 sexes, and a dispensary for the sick poor, are the cha-
 ritable institutions. Fairs, January 11th, April 21st,
 May 9th, June 22d, July 22d, September 4th, and
 October 20th. Population, in 1841, 1,577.
