BALTINGLASS

IS a market and post town and parish, the latter partly in the barony of Rathilly, county of Carlow, but chiefly in the barony of Talbot's-town, county of Wicklow, 37 miles S.W. from Dublin, 19 S. by W. from Blessington, 11 N. of Tullow, and 8 N.W. from Hacketstown; pleasantly seated on the banks of the river Slaney, close to the border of Kildare county. The town has a very respectable appearance, and the scenery in its vicinity is very beautiful—such a landscape as that viewed from the site of the Protestant school, on the Dublin road, is rarely to be seen. There are several extensive corn mills in the neighbourhood, among which those belonging to Mr. Thomas Chandlee are of considerable magnitude. Lord Aldborough is the patron and ruler of this town, the corporation being virtually extinct. Quarter and petty sessions are held here; the latter every fortnight. The public buildings, exclusive of the religious structures, are a court-house; the district

gael or bridewell; the union poor-house, about a mile from the town; military and constabulary barracks, and a dispensary.
 The places of worship are the established church, a neat building, with a tower, and a Roman Catholic and Wesleyan Methodist chapels. There are two public schools, viz.—the Protestant free school; the other under the superintendence of the national board of education. At the northern end of the church is a fine ruin of the Cistercian abbey, founded in the beginning of the twelfth century; it was richly endowed, and its abbot was entitled to a seat in parliament. Baltinglass Castle, of which there are still remains, was originally the residence of the abbots, and a parliament was once held within its walls. The market is held on Friday, and fairs January 9th, February 2nd, March 17th, May 12th, July 1st, August 18th, Sept. 12th, Oct. 18th, and December 8th. Population of the town, in 1841, 1,928.

BANAGHER

IS a market town, in the parish of Reynagh, barony of Garry-Castle, King's county, 84 miles S.W. from Dublin, 18 S.E. from Ballinasloe, and 25 miles from Shannon harbour; seated on the left bank of the river Shannon, over which is a noble stone bridge of seven arches, 50 feet span, forming a communication between the provinces of Leinster and Connaught, one half of the bridge being in King's county and the other in Galway. The first stone of this bridge was laid August 21st, 1841, and it was completed August 14th, 1843. Near the bridge, on the Galway side, are two large towers, each planted with a traversing gun; and at the south-west of the bridge is a sod battery, mounting three traversing guns, for the purpose of protecting or destroying the bridge, in case of an attack from the Connaught quarter. At the foot of the bridge is a good barrack for two companies of foot soldiers, with a military battery mounting three guns, and a large magazine underneath, bomb and water proof. This barrack, formerly a nunnery, communicated with the church by a subterraneous passage four hundred yards in length. The town consists of one wide main street, gradually rising from the river to the church, fully three-quarters of a mile in length; another narrower street cuts the main street at right angles. There are several handsome houses in the town, and an absence of those squalid mud cabins too common in others; on the whole, a stranger, on his entrance, will pronounce Banagher to be a cleanly, pleasing place. There are two large corn mills, a tannery, a distillery, branches of the Dublin

Banking Company and of the National Bank. From an excellent hotel here (lately enlarged and improved) a car will be sent, gratis, to Shannon harbour, to meet any parties coming from Dublin or Limerick, by water, to Banagher, if they will previously send a line to Mr. Mann, the proprietor; it is a comfortable house for invalids and commercial gentlemen. Banagher possesses so many facilities for trade that enterprise, ere long, must greatly extend it. There is a steam vessel communication between Banagher, Limerick, Shannon harbour, and Athlone. Petty sessions are held the second Monday in every month.

The church of Reynagh has thrown up its lofty tower and spire upon a site so elevated as to be seen a great distance around; and it is a fine terminating object of the principal street, down which it looks. The church is of stone and cruciform, the interior being very tastefully arranged. The Roman Catholic chapel is plain, but very capacious. Half a mile distant, at Cuba House, is a large school, originally endowed by letters patent in the reign of Charles II.; it is now under the control of the board of education. There are also a national and an infants' school; a dispensary here dispenses its healing benefits to a large district. A short distance to the south of the town are the ruins of Garry Castle, and in the vicinity is Cloghan Castle, the seat of Garrett O'Moore, Esq., perhaps the oldest inhabited castle in Ireland. The market is held on Friday, and the fair commences on the 15th of September, and continues a week. Population, in 1841, 2,827.
